

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

IMPROVED HEALTH RANKING FOR GRANT COUNTY

ecent reports released by the Trust for America's Health and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation indicate that obesity is on the rise, with Kentucky ranked as the sixth highest state with 31.5 percent of adults considered obese. The "2012 County Health Rankings: Kentucky" show Grant County as number 74 out of Kentucky's 120 counties in the area of health behaviors. This is an

improvement over past years which may be attributed to efforts of the FFLAG (Fitness For Life Around Grant County) coalition. The Grant County Cooperative Extension 4-H/Youth Development and Family and Consumer Sciences are active participants of the coalition with such programs as the Biggest Winner Challenge, which was held for the eighth year in April 2012.





OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Grant County:

- 25.4% (+/- 5.4) families with related children were below poverty
- **8.5%** (+/- **3.8**) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 21.8% (+/- 2.1) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 20104
- 451 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 5,803 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in **Grant County Extension programs:**²

- 751 people reported spending time in physical activity.
- 1,862 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 937 people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Grant County:

- 66.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 61.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the **12** primary care physicians in Grant County:⁹

- 83.3% are family practice
- 8.3% are pediatricians
- 8.3% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in **Grant County Extension programs:**²

- 132 people are involved in addressing community
- 25 people increased awareness of how to manage current economic events.
- 321 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.




According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Grant County:

- 25.7% (14.0 42.4) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 27.9% (16.7 42.7) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 -**23.6)** in the state
- 25.8% (15.3 40.2) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Grant County Extension** programs:²

- 1,712 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 922 people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- 900 people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
