
OUR FOCUS

COOKING CLUB FOR YOUTH

asic food preparation skills can be an important tool for lifelong healthy eating patterns. To increase local middle school youth's skills in the kitchen Hancock County 4-H Youth Development agent partnered with the Youth Service Center and Community Education to start an afterschool 4-H Cooking Club. The club met monthly and each month different kitchen techniques were taught along with nutrition lessons for the accompanying foods. At the

conclusion of the club meetings and lessons, written surveys were completed. They revealed: 95% of students tried at least 3 new fruits or vegetables; 100% tried a new food; 100% feel comfortable using a knife; 100% learned safety around ovens and stoves; and 91% gained a new understanding of portion control.





OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Hancock County:

- 19.3% (+/- 7.8) families with related children were below poverty
- 15.1% (+/- 6.7) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 17.5% (+/- 1.8) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 20104
- 133 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 1,224 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in Hancock County Extension programs:²

- 15 people supplemented their diet with food they produced or preserved.
- 65 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 55 people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Hancock County:

- 62.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 67.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the 1 primary care physicians in Hancock County:9

- 100.0% are family practice
- 0.0% are pediatricians
- 0.0% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in Hancock County Extension programs:²

- 58 people are involved in addressing community
- 46 people increased leadership knowledge and
- 220 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.

OUR HEALTH


According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Hancock County:

- 18.7% (7.3 40.5) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 15.6% (8.7 26.5) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 **- 23.6)** in the state
- 39.9% (23.0 59.5) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Hancock County Extension** programs:²

- 220 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 160 people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.
- 100 people implemented safe storage, handling and food preparation practices.
