#### **OUR FOCUS**

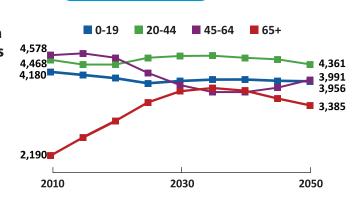
Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Henry County. To help families make wise decisions our educational programs focus on:

# MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

entucky is consistently ranked among the top 10 states for obesity. Because research shows that competition and financial gain are two of the biggest motivators for weight loss, the Henry County Cooperative Extension Service collaborated with a local church and the health department to offer a "Biggest Loser" competition this summer. There were 59 participants in 13 teams registered for the

10-week competition, which included weekly weigh-ins, weekly educational sessions, and handouts. As a result of the competition, the participants lost a total of 609 pounds. Five participants lost 10 percent or more of their body weight, and seven participants lost 20 pounds or more. Twenty-seven individuals had pre- and post-body fat analyses, and the average decrease in percent body fat was 3.9.





#### **OUR FAMILIES**

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,<sup>3</sup> between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Henry County:

- 24.1% (+/- 5.7) families with related children were below poverty
- 12.1% (+/- 4.2) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

#### In addition:

- 21.2% (+/- 2.0) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 20104
- 268 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010<sup>5</sup>
- 2,734 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012<sup>6</sup>

#### As a result of participating in Henry County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 131 people reported spending time in physical activity.
- 700 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 40 people reported eating more healthy foods.

#### **OUR COMMUNITY**

#### In Henry County:

- 71.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009<sup>7</sup>
- 62.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the **6** primary care physicians in Henry County: <sup>9</sup>

- 66.7% are family practice
- 0.0% are pediatricians
- 0.0% are OB/GYN

#### As a result of participating in Henry County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 57 people are involved in addressing community
- 405 people increased awareness of how to manage current economic events.
- 135 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.



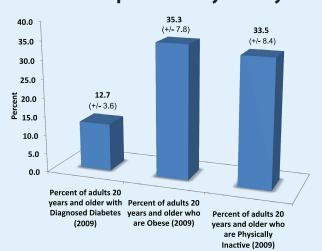
According to the Kentucky BRFSS, in 2010 in Henry County's KIPDA Area Development District:10

- 74.6% (68.4 88.7) women age 40 and over had a mammogram in the past two years, compared to 69.9% (67.7 - 72.2) in the state
- **82.3%** (**78.4 86.1**) of adults reported their health as good, compared to 78.5% (77.1 - 79.8) in the state
- 44.6% (39.1 50.1) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

#### As a result of participating in **Henry County Extension** programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 32 people in Stand Up to Falling plan to be more physically active to prevent falls.
- 390 people demonstrated effective decision-making.
- 136 people implemented personal health protection practices.
