

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

SAMPLING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

he Hopkins County Cooperative Extension Service's Family and Consumer Sciences and 4-H agents, along with the SNAP and 4-H program assistants, partnered with community agencies to conduct the LEAP program to all students at Jesse Stuart Elementary school during March Nutrition Month. Coalition members provided fruit and vegetable samples to the students and teachers on Fridays in March during lunch. The students were also given newsletters to

take home to their parents with a healthy recipe to try at home. Five hundred seventeen students participated in the sampling. Three hundred thirty-six students reported trying a food they had never tried before. One-third of those students have now eaten at least one of the foods at home.





OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in **Hopkins County:**

- 25.3% (+/- 3.3) families with related children were below poverty
- 10.2% (+/- 1.9) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 21.7% (+/- 1.8) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 20104
- 714 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 9,402 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in **Hopkins County Extension programs:**²

- 425 people demonstrated informed and effective decision making.
- 160 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 41 people utilized healthy food access points and delivery systems.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Hopkins County:

- 77.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 66.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the 67 primary care physicians in Hopkins County:9

- 62.7% are family practice
- 6.0% are pediatricians
- 11.9% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in **Hopkins County Extension programs:**²

- 140 people are involved in addressing community issues.
- 30 people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- 281 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.

OUR HEALTH


According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Hopkins County:

- 17.0% (12.2 23.1) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 26.1% (20.5 32.5) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 - 23.6) in the state
- 47.9% (40.8 55.2) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Hopkins County Extension** programs:²

- 160 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 40 people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.
- 20 people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
