OUR FOCUS

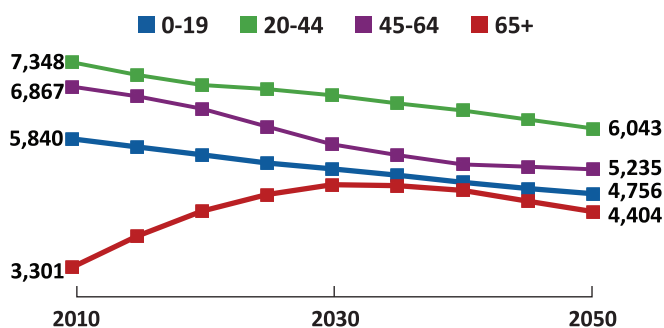
Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Johnson County. To help families make wise decisions our educational programs focus on:

In 2011-2012, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **28,136** contacts with Johnson County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

Statistics indicate that the incidence of obesity and related diseases is increasing among adults. Focus has increased on making healthy food choices habits in youth. To reinforce healthy choices, the Highlands Health program was piloted and presented by the Johnson County Cooperative Extension Service to 520 students, teachers and food staff at Highlands Elementary. They were taught the basics of nutrition and given samples from each food group with a special emphasis on fruits and vegetables. As a result of the program, over half of the students indicated that they had adopted more positive healthful practices since the program began, such as drinking more water, eating more fruits, vegetables, and variety of foods, and exercising more each day.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Johnson County:



- **29.7% (+/- 6.2)** families with related children were below poverty
- **19.7% (+/- 6.4)** of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- **23.2% (+/- 2.1)** of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010⁴
- **598** children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- **7,291** people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in Johnson County Extension programs:²

- **600** people were reached on the importance of physical activity.
- **232** people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- **830** people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Johnson County:

- **56.0%** of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- **53.0%** of ordered child support was collected in 2011⁸

Of the **20** primary care physicians in Johnson County:⁹

- **55.0%** are family practice
- **15.0%** are pediatricians
- **10.0%** are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in Johnson County Extension programs:²

- **112** people are involved in addressing community issues.
- **60** people implemented personal health protection practices.
- **843** people were able to utilize new decision-making skills for health.

OUR HEALTH

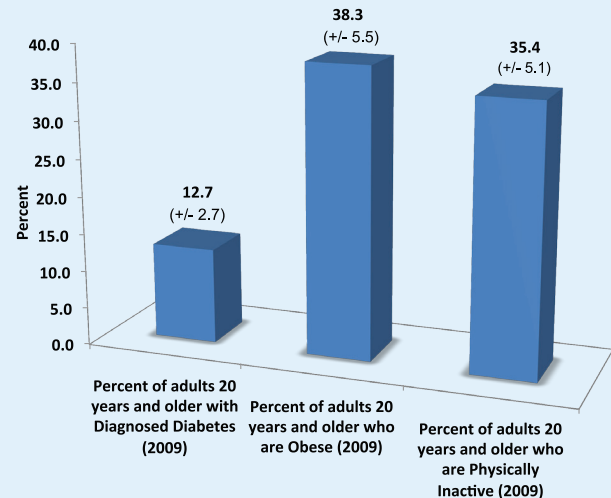
According to Kentucky Health Facts,¹⁰ between 2008 and 2010 in Johnson County:

- **19.8% (13.5 - 28.0)** did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to **18% (17.0 - 18.6)** in the state
- **32.6% (26.1 - 40.0)** of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to **23% (22.0 - 23.6)** in the state
- **36.1% (29.4 - 43.4)** of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in Johnson County Extension programs:²

- **500** people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- **100** people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- **50** people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
