

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

INCREASING HEALTHY FOOD CHOICES

ccording to the Foundation for a Healthy Kentucky, 37 percent of Kentucky youth ages 10 to 17 are overweight or obese. To help fight the problem in Leslie County, Family and Consumer Sciences and 4-H Youth Development agents partnered with the local board of education to teach Exploring MyPyramid to 426 students in first through fourth grades. In six lessons students took part in physical

activity exercises and sampled new foods. Pre- and post-tests were given to the students, with the results showing: 86 percent learning that MyPyramid shows healthy food choices; 72 percent eating fruits every day or most days of the week; 72 percent eating wholegrains everyday or most days of the week; and 75 percent reporting that they are physically active every day.





OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Leslie County:

- 18.7% (+/- 7.1) families with related children were below poverty
- 21.8% (+/- 7.7) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 23.7% (+/- 2.2) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010⁴
- 261 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 4,008 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in Leslie County Extension programs:²

- 651 people were reached with the importance of physical activity.
- 734 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 153 people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Leslie County:

- 65.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 61.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the **9** primary care physicians in Leslie County: ⁹

- 22.2% are family practice
- 0.0% are pediatricians
- 22.2% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in Leslie County Extension programs: 2

- 180 people are involved in addressing community
- 125 people increased awareness of how to manage current economic events.
- 623 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.




According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Leslie County:

- 35.5% (26.1 46.1) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 35.8% (27.4 45.2) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 -**23.6)** in the state
- 27.9% (20.7 36.4) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Leslie County Extension** programs:²

- 758 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 743 people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- 347 people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
