OUR FOCUS


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Letcher County. To help families make wise decisions our educational programs focus on:

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

HEALTHY MOTHERS, HEALTHY BABIES

hen an expectant mother receives proper nutrition and is healthy overall, she is likely to have a smoother pregnancy and a healthier baby. Spreading this message was the goal behind two baby fairs held in June 2012. The first was held in Hazard, primarily reaching expectant moms, moms of infants up to 2 years old, and caregivers from Perry and Leslie counties. The second was held in Whitesburg for the same target groups but this time from

Letcher County. Fifteen agencies participated with Cooperative Extension Service agents, providing free information and publications on how they can support the mothers and families of young children. A total of 85 mothers and expectant mothers participated, along with some fathers and caregivers.





OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in **Letcher County:**

- 30.1% (+/- 6.3) families with related children were below poverty
- 21.0% (+/- 4.9) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 23.3% (+/- 2.0) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010⁴
- 492 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 7,589 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in **Letcher County Extension programs:**²

- 1,508 people were reached with the importance of physical activity.
- 1,512 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 505 people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Letcher County:

- 71.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 54.0% of ordered child support was collected in 2011 8

Of the **23** primary care physicians in Letcher County:⁹

- 34.8% are family practice
- 17.4% are pediatricians
- 4.3% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in **Letcher County Extension programs:**²

- 1,218 people are involved in addressing community
- 312 people reported accessing healthy community food sources such as farmers markets or food pantry.
- 796 people were reached to build skills for personal health and safety.

OUR HEALTH


According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Letcher County:

- 23.7% (18.1 30.4) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 31.2% (25.1 37.9) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 -**23.6)** in the state
- 36.4% (29.9 43.3) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Letcher County Extension** programs:²

- 428 youth reported eating more healthy foods.
- 1,510 people reported eating healthy foods they produced or preserved.
- 455 people experienced a change in knowledge about eating more healthy
