OUR FOCUS

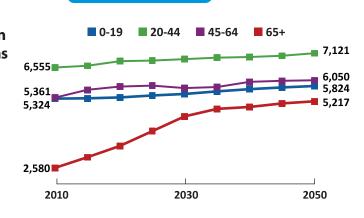
Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Marion County. To help families make wise decisions our educational programs focus on:

- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period

In 2011-2012, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **11,109** contacts with Marion County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MELT DOWN MARION COUNTY

eveloping a healthy lifestyle is imperative considering that close to one-third of Kentuckians, and one-third of Marion Countians, remain overweight and/or obese with continued unhealthy lifestyle choices. Melt Down Marion County is a 10-week program that uses the University of Kentucky's "Weight-the-Reality Series" educational curriculum connecting weight loss to healthy eating and physical activity. Community partners along with the Marion County Cooperative Extension Service helped facilitate, promote, and teach lessons. Weekly programs include stages of change, realistic lifestyle

goals, cooking demonstrations, and meal planning. Participants planned to reach their goal weight by the end of the program, increase physical activity, and eat healthier. Out of the 43 participants, 222.6 pounds were lost. Of this group, 29 met their goal and all participants had positive comments on the end evaluation.





OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Marion County:

- 19.1% (+/- 4.6) families with related children were below poverty
- 20.1% (+/- 4.0) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 23.5% (+/- 2.3) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010⁴
- 304 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 4,250 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in Marion County Extension programs:²

- 200 people reported spending time in physical activity.
- 925 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 319 people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Marion County:

- 74.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 57.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the **13** primary care physicians in Marion County: ⁹

- 38.5% are family practice
- 23.1% are pediatricians
- 15.4% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in Marion County Extension programs:²

- 219 people are involved in addressing community
- 119 people implemented personal health protection practices.
- 685 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.

OUR HEALTH

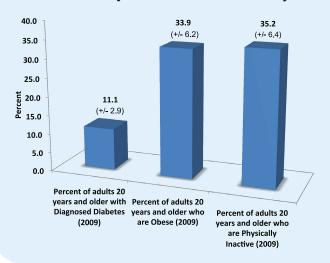
According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Marion County:

- 10.3% (5.4 18.7) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 19.7% (13.0 28.6) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0) **- 23.6)** in the state
- 48.9% (36.4 61.4) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Marion County Extension** programs:²

- 970 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 1,103 people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- 65 people in Stand Up to Falling plan to be more physically active to prevent falls.
