#### **OUR FOCUS**


Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Owen County. To help families make wise decisions our educational programs focus on:

# RECIPES FOR LIFE

recent New York Times article entitled "Time to Revive Home Ec" stated that this subject matter was important to prepare students after high school graduation. School budget constraints and testing requirements have led to the demise of Family and Consumer Sciences programs that taught these life skills. Owen County Extension agent for Family and Consumer Sciences taught a hands-on school project entitled "Recipes for Life" to promote nutrition and healthy eating to students in their communities. This

project brought fifth-grade classes to the extension office to learn recipe reading and cooking techniques. As a result, the students stated they have utilized the recipes and cooking techniques in their own kitchen and have begun helping their families to prepare meals.





#### **OUR FAMILIES**

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,<sup>3</sup> between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Owen County:

- 12.0% (+/- 4.9) families with related children were below poverty
- 14.7% (+/- 5.7) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

#### In addition:

- 22.0% (+/- 2.2) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010<sup>4</sup>
- 199 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010<sup>5</sup>
- 2,244 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012<sup>6</sup>

#### As a result of participating in Owen County Extension programs: 2

- 201 people were reached with the importance of physical activity.
- 160 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 100 people reported eating more healthy foods.

#### **OUR COMMUNITY**

#### In Owen County:

- 62.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009<sup>7</sup>
- 59.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the **7** primary care physicians in Owen County:<sup>9</sup>

- 85.7% are family practice
- 0.0% are pediatricians
- 0.0% are OB/GYN

#### As a result of participating in Owen County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 500 people in Plate it Up! Kentucky Proud indicated they are more likely to buy Kentucky produce.
- 201 people increased awareness of how to manage current economic events.
- 375 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.

## **OUR HEALTH**


According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Owen County:

- 14.2% (6.1 29.6) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 27.9% (15.8 44.5) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to **23% (22.0 - 23.6)** in the state
- 33.5% (19.6 50.9) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

#### As a result of participating in **Owen County Extension** programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 200 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 125 people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- 250 people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
