
OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

he Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP-Ed) was implemented in Rowan County in May 2011. Since its beginning, there have been programs taught to families, youth, and other groups regarding nutrition and food safety. Among those programs were nutrition classes at Rowan



County Senior High School. During this week, the topics covered were fast food, food safety, and individual food groups. Each day 80 students were introduced to a different food with taste testing sessions. A positive impact was seen among these students; with more than 80 percent were able to correctly identify all food groups and food group serving amounts. Students have reported switching to Fat Free Greek Yogurt, trying new types of vegetables, drinking skim milk, and encouraging their parents to buy healthier foods to keep at home.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in **Rowan County:**

- 27.2% (+/- 5.0) families with related children were below poverty
- 22.1% (+/- 6.6) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 24.5% (+/- 2.8) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010⁴
- 351 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 5,258 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in Rowan County Extension programs:²

- 1,090 people reported spending time in physical activity.
- 1,550 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 925 people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Rowan County:

- 65.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 59.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the **27** primary care physicians in Rowan County:⁹

- 51.9% are family practice
- 7.4% are pediatricians
- 3.7% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in Rowan County Extension programs:²

- **300** people are involved in addressing community
- 200 people increased awareness of how to manage current economic events.
- 160 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.

OUR HEALTH


According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Rowan County:

- 21.0% (15.2 28.2) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 17.9% (13.6 23.3) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 -**23.6)** in the state
- 41.0% (33.7 48.7) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Rowan County Extension** programs:²

- 1,300 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 775 people made diet or exercise changes to improve health.
- 767 people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
