

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

GOOD HEALTH TREASURE HUNT

n Simpson County, local health issues such as obesity and lack of physical activity were identified as program priorities by local stakeholders. To address such issues, the Simpson County Cooperative Extension Service's Family and Consumer Sciences agent developed the Good Health Treasure Hunt with 13 interactive, hands-on learning centers for eighth-graders. As a result 224 youth made changes in health practices related to nutrition and physical activity. In a follow-up evaluation, 69% of students indicated they had increased knowledge and 67% of students made comments about

specific behavior changes, which included: making healthier food choices; avoiding smoking and drinking; maintaining a healthier weight by eating better; and increasing exercise. Other health programs implemented by Simpson County extension reached an additional 2,550 adults and youth.





OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Simpson County:

- 17.3% (+/- 6.5) families with related children were below poverty
- 14.8% (+/- 4.7) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 20.5% (+/- 2.1) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 20104
- 349 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 3,081 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in Simpson County Extension programs:²

- 416 people were reached on the importance of physical activity.
- 183 adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 179 people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Simpson County:

- 47.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 64.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the 11 primary care physicians in Simpson County:9

- 54.5% are family practice
- 0.0% are pediatricians
- 0.0% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in Simpson County Extension programs:²

- 412 people are involved in addressing community
- 277 people made lifestyle changes at home to improve health.
- 1,976 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.

OUR HEALTH


According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Simpson County:

- 8.3% (3.7 17.7) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 15.9% (9.2 26.1) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 **- 23.6)** in the state
- 33.8% (21.8 48.4) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Simpson County Extension** programs:²

- 279 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 248 people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy food safety practices.
- 279 people experienced a change in knowledge of healthy home practices and stress management.
