
Family and Consumer Sciences

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

INCREASING FRUIT AND VEGETABLE CONSUMPTION

arren County's Farmers Market
Summer Series was a program that
focused on the consumption of
fruits and vegetables. The program lasted for
five months and focused on produce that was
in peak season. There were 63 people who



participated in the series. With the distribution of recipes and samples, this program resulted in families preparing more produce and consuming it in different ways. Stressing the importance of consuming five fruits and vegetables each day made people more aware of the food that they are eating. Eighty percent of the participants in the program prepared the distributed recipes at home, and 95 percent said that they have enjoyed more produce this year than ever before.



OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 American Community Survey,³ between 2006 and 2010 it is estimated that in Warren County:

- 19.9% (+/- 2.5) families with related children were below poverty
- **8.0%** (+/- **1.7**) of those over the age of 65 were below poverty

In addition:

- 20.5% (+/- 1.8) of those ages 18-64 did not have health insurance in 2010⁴
- 1,608 children on average received Kentucky Children's Health Insurance Program (KCHIP) benefits in 2010⁵
- 19,524 people received Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in 2012⁶

As a result of participating in Warren County Extension programs:²

- 100 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- 500 people increased their knowledge about healthy foods.
- 500 people reported eating more healthy foods.

OUR COMMUNITY

In Warren County:

- 52.0% of births were to mothers who received early and regular prenatal care in 2009⁷
- 66.0% of ordered child support was collected in 20118

Of the **97** primary care physicians in Warren County:⁹

- 32.0% are family practice
- 17.5% are pediatricians
- 16.5% are OB/GYN

As a result of participating in Warren County Extension programs:²

- 230 people are involved in addressing community
- 310 people were reached on the importance of physical activity.
- 1,740 people were able to utilize new decisionmaking skills for health.

OUR HEALTH


According to Kentucky Health Facts, 10 between 2008 and 2010 in Warren County:

- 14.3% (10.3 19.6) did not pursue health care due to cost, compared to 18% (17.0 - 18.6) in the state
- 20.5% (16.0 25.8) of adults reported their health status as less than good, compared to 23% (22.0 -**23.6)** in the state
- 40.3% (34.4 46.4) of adults reported having received a flu vaccine in the past year

As a result of participating in **Warren County Extension** programs:²

- 250 people increased knowledge of diet and exercise changes to improve health.
- 300 people made food safety changes to improve health.
- 200 people implemented personal health protection practices.
