


OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

HEALTHY COOKING BASICS

esearch shows that only 15 percent know, at 4 pm, what they will have for dinner that evening, which can lead to consuming more fast food and meals eaten outside of the home. Preparing meals at home can also be more cost-effective, but many lack the skills to prepare healthy meals. As a result, the Bourbon County Extension Service provided a series of healthy cooking classes reaching 52 people. Pre-series surveys indicated that over half did not know how to cook fresh, non-processed foods; 75 percent never tried new dishes because they were unsure how to prepare the items; and 99 percent were willing to try different cooking methods to make their meals healthier. Participants' positive feedback encouraged extension to continue and expand the program.

FAMILY ACCESS

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Bourbon County...

- 21.4% (+/- 4.6) of families with children were below poverty
- 8.9% (+/- 3.7) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 21.9% (+/- 2.6) of households had retirement income
- 8.3% (+/- 2.1) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas⁴ indicates that in 2010. Bourbon County had 1,505 people, 368 children and 175 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.*

In addition, **523** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

As a result of participating in **Bourbon County Extension programs:**²

- 50 people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- 50 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 12 people were involved in addressing community

COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY

In 2011, Bourbon County had:

- 3 Grocery stores (any kind)⁵
 - 3 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)⁵
 - O Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)⁵
- 13 Gasoline stations with convenience stores⁵

In the county, there were:

- 6 Roadside markets that served the county⁶
- 2 Farmers market locations⁷
- 22 SNAP** authorized stores (food stamps)⁴
- 4 WIC*** authorized stores4

In 2011, there were \$263,672.14 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Bourbon County.4

As a result of participating in **Bourbon County Extension programs:**²

- 225 families/caregivers increased their knowledge about eating more healthy foods.
- 100 youth increased knowledge about personal
- 100 people reported eating more healthy foods.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

In Bourbon County...

- 1,516 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP** (food stamps) in 2011, up from **1,037** children in 2007 (up 46.2%).9
- **60.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 2,040 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$272.48.8


Bourbon County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.¹⁰

As a result of participating in **Bourbon County Extension** programs:²

- 25 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 100 people supplemented their diets with healthy foods they produced or preserved.
- 250 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
