
OUR FOCUS

In 2012-2013, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **15,008** contacts with Bullitt County individuals and families.²





SPOTLIGHT ON ...

COOKING FROM THE GARDEN

ncreasing access to fresh, locally grown vegetables is important to consumers as well as producers. For a second summer, the Bullitt County FCS agent collaborated with Crossroad Elementary School Garden Club to teach students about nutrition and how to fully utilize their harvest. Working with the teacher and family resource director, 24 elementary school children participated in four classes about increasing their fruit and vegetable intake using produce grown in their garden. Program evaluations indicate that in four weeks: more than 95 percent of the children sampled a variety of recipes and returned home to share with a parent or prepare for their family; 25 percent returned their weekly record indicating they ate five fruits and vegetables each day; and 100 percent increased the fruits and vegetable consumption.



FAMILY ACCESS

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Bullitt County...

- 10.6% (+/- 2.3) of families with children were below poverty
- 8.4% (+/- 2.5) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 22.3% (+/- 1.4) of households had retirement income
- 3.2% (+/- 0.7) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas⁴ indicates that in 2010. Bullitt County had 18,938 people, 4,700 children and 2,066 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.*

In addition, **5,320** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

As a result of participating in **Bullitt County Extension programs:**²

- 746 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 44 people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 38 people were involved in addressing community issues.

COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY

In 2011, Bullitt County had:

- 8 Grocery stores (any kind)⁵
 - 6 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)⁵
 - 2 Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)⁵
- 29 Gasoline stations with convenience stores⁵

In the county, there were:

- 8 Roadside markets that served the county⁶
- 2 Farmers market locations⁷
- 52 SNAP** authorized stores (food stamps)⁴
- 6 WIC*** authorized stores⁴

In 2011, there were \$87,398.19 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Bullitt County.4

As a result of participating in **Bullitt County Extension programs:**²

- 381 youth reported eating more healthy foods.
- 617 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 245 families spent time together in physical activity.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

In Bullitt County...

- 3,873 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP** (food stamps) in 2011, up from **2,854** children in 2007 (up **35.7%**).9
- **46.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 4,513 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$287.71.8

Bullitt County is served by Dare to Care Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.¹⁰

As a result of participating in **Bullitt County Extension** programs:²

- 250 people supplemented their diets with healthy foods they produced or preserved.
- 1,025 people were reached with information on accessing healthy foods.
- 717 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
