


#### **OUR FOCUS**

# PLATE IT UP! KENTUCKY PROUD

ncreasing the availability of local foods has been a significant effort in Butler County. The Butler County Cooperative Extension Service supports the efforts through the "Plate It Up! Kentucky Proud" program, where staff demonstrate healthy recipes and promote proper preparation techniques reaching over 300 people. Postevaluation results indicate: 72 percent of surveyed youth stated they now ask for fruits and vegetables as snacks; 69 percent of the adults said they now provide more fruits and vegetable to their families; and 79 percent of the Latino population stated they increased their consumption of fruits and vegetables. Additionally, farmer vendors report an increase in sales as more people search for fresh products they have seen demonstrated in extension programs.

# **FAMILY ACCESS**

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Butler County...

- 21.1% (+/- 5.6) of families with children were below poverty
- 21.2% (+/- 7.1) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 17.5% (+/- 2.8) of households had retirement income
- 8.2% (+/- 2.4) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas<sup>4</sup> indicates that in 2010. Butler County had 1,488 people, 331 children and 213 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.\*

In addition, **636** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

#### As a result of participating in **Butler County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 682 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 159 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 325 people increased leadership knowledge and skills.

# **COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY**

In 2011, Butler County had:

- 4 Grocery stores (any kind)<sup>5</sup>
  - 3 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)<sup>5</sup>
  - 1 Convenience store (i.e. food marts no gas)<sup>5</sup>
- 6 Gasoline stations with convenience stores<sup>5</sup>

In the county, there were:

- 1 Roadside market that served the county<sup>6</sup>
- **0** Farmers market locations<sup>7</sup>
- 20 SNAP\*\* authorized stores (food stamps)<sup>4</sup>
- 5 WIC\*\*\* authorized stores<sup>4</sup>

In 2011, there were \$143,712.66 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Butler County.4

### As a result of participating in **Butler County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 338 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- 201 people implemented practices for safe storage, handling, and preparation of food.
- 464 people reported eating more healthy foods.

# **FOOD ASSISTANCE**

In Butler County...

- 1,100 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP\*\* (food stamps) in 2011, up from **835** children in 2007 (up **31.7%)**.9
- **59.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 1,344 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$263.69.8


Butler County is served by Feeding America, Kentucky's Heartland of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.<sup>10</sup>

## As a result of participating in **Butler County Extension** programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 372 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- **560** families/caregivers increased their knowledge about eating healthy foods.
- **752** youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
