
#### **OUR FOCUS**

# **SPOTLIGHT ON ...**

# GARDENING CLUB

any students attending Owensboro's Newton Parrish Elementary school live in multifamily housing with little green space and few opportunities for gardening. The Daviess County Extension Service staff, in collaboration with the local family resource coordinator, organized a four-week garden club for 20 Newton Parrish students. The program addressed seed identification, sowing seeds, transplanting seedlings, and weeding in the flower garden. The students were introduced to and sampled new fruits and vegetables, as well as discussed the nutritional importance. As a result of the program: all of the students had tried at least one new fruit or vegetable: 80 percent indicated they had learned about one or more new fruit or vegetable; and 100 percent learned and demonstrated a new gardening skill.



# **FAMILY ACCESS**

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Daviess County...

- 18.0% (+/- 2.3) of families with children were below poverty
- 9.9% (+/- 1.9) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 20.1% (+/- 1.1) of households had retirement income
- 7.1% (+/- 0.8) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas<sup>4</sup> indicates that in 2010, Daviess County had 17,361 people, 4,445 children and 2,303 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.\*

In addition, **4,224** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

#### As a result of participating in **Daviess County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 2,600 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 550 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 107 people in Taking Control of Your Diabetes utilized a diabetes meal plan.

# **COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY**

In 2011, Daviess County had:

- 20 Grocery stores (any kind)<sup>5</sup>
  - 15 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)<sup>5</sup>
  - 5 Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)<sup>5</sup>
- 53 Gasoline stations with convenience stores<sup>5</sup>

In the county, there were:

- 3 Roadside markets that served the county<sup>6</sup>
- 3 Farmers market locations<sup>7</sup>
- 103 SNAP\*\* authorized stores (food stamps)<sup>4</sup>
- 13 WIC\*\*\* authorized stores4

In 2011, there were \$262,689.07 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Daviess County.4

#### As a result of participating in **Daviess County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 1,577 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- 3,464 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 4,543 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.

# **FOOD ASSISTANCE**

In Daviess County...

- 6,527 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP\*\* (food stamps) in 2011, up from **5,225** children in 2007 (up **24.9%**).9
- **54.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 7,872 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$266.77.8


Daviess County is served by Tri-State Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.<sup>10</sup>

## As a result of participating in **Daviess County Extension** programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 100 people supplemented their diets with healthy foods they produced or preserved.
- 664 people in Plate it Up! Kentucky Proud indicated they are more likely to buy Kentucky produce.
- 1,225 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
