
#### **OUR FOCUS**

### **SPOTLIGHT ON ...**

## SUMMER FOOD COOKING SERIES

The National Gardening Association's annual survey showed that nationwide household participation in do-it-yourself lawn and garden activities in 2012 increased by 2 million households (2 percent) over 2011. To capitalize on the interest in gardening, the Hardin County Cooperative Extension Service offered a spring program on "How to Grow" followed by summer cooking classes using the harvest. The hands-on series emphasized fruit and vegetable preparation, food safety, preservation, and nutrient value. Forty-nine people participated in workshops such as: "Thrill of the Grill," "Jamming Berries," "Simple Sensational Salads," "Scrumptious Squash," and "Kicking Kentucky Carrots." Post-series evaluations indicated that all respondents reported using techniques or recipes from the series and 50 percent of respondents had tried a new fruit or vegetable featured in a class.



### **FAMILY ACCESS**

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Hardin County...

- 17.6% (+/- 2.1) of families with children were below poverty
- 6.9% (+/- 1.8) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 26.4% (+/- 1.2) of households had retirement income
- **4.7%** (+/- 0.8) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas<sup>4</sup> indicates that in 2010, Hardin County had 24,451 people, 6,630 children and 2,287 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.\*

In addition, **8,705** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

#### As a result of participating in Hardin County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 214 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 700 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 297 people were involved in addressing community issues.

#### **COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY**

In 2011, Hardin County had:

- 23 Grocery stores (any kind)<sup>5</sup>
  - 14 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)<sup>5</sup>
  - 9 Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)<sup>5</sup>
- 42 Gasoline stations with convenience stores<sup>5</sup>

In the county, there were:

- 4 Roadside markets that served the county<sup>6</sup>
- 3 Farmers market locations<sup>7</sup>
- 97 SNAP\*\* authorized stores (food stamps)<sup>4</sup>
- 14 WIC\*\*\* authorized stores4

In 2011, there were \$261,361.01 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Hardin County.4

#### As a result of participating in Hardin County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 100 people in Managing in Tough Times: Moneywi\$e became aware of how to manage current economic events.
- 165 people implemented practices for safe storage, handling, and preparation of food.
- 750 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.

#### **FOOD ASSISTANCE**

In Hardin County...

- 5,964 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP\*\* (food stamps) in 2011, up from **4,562** children in 2007 (up **30.7%**).9
- 48.0% of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 6,769 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$277.70.8

Hardin County is served by Feeding America, Kentucky's Heartland of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.<sup>10</sup>

#### As a result of participating in Hardin County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 2,150 people in Plate it Up! Kentucky Proud indicated they are more likely to buy produce.
- 1,378 youth were reached with information on eating healthy foods.
- 1,303 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
