


OUR FOCUS

Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Johnson County. To help families make wise decisions, our educational programs focus on:

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

LONG-TERM RECOVERY

he Johnson County Family and Consumer Sciences staff and volunteers responded to the tornado disaster in 2012 by assisting more than 520 victims. Food, clothing, and resources were managed for 40 days following the disaster. The FCS agent currently serves on the Long-Term Recovery Committee, which provides support and continues to work with the families, providing food to victims through the backpack program, the farmers market, and an emergency food fund managed by Extension Homemakers. As of fall 2013, there were 70 families still receiving support to overcome the damages incurred from the storm.

FAMILY ACCESS

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Johnson County...

- 29.4% (+/- 6.3) of families with children were below poverty
- 14.3% (+/- 4.1) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 19.1% (+/- 2.3) of households had retirement income
- 8.6% (+/- 2.1) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas⁴ indicates that in 2010. Johnson County had 2,321 people, 527 children and 334 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.*

In addition, **1,089** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

As a result of participating in Johnson County Extension programs:²

- 858 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 100 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 111 people were involved in addressing community

COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY

In 2011, Johnson County had:

- 2 Grocery stores (any kind)⁵
 - 2 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)⁵
 - O Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)⁵
- 13 Gasoline stations with convenience stores⁵

In the county, there were:

- 1 Roadside markets that served the county⁶
- 1 Farmers market location⁷
- 37 SNAP** authorized stores (food stamps)⁴
- 7 WIC*** authorized stores⁴

In 2011, there were \$368,496.40 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Johnson County.4

As a result of participating in Johnson County Extension programs:²

- 500 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 500 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 300 families spent time together in physical activity.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

In Johnson County...

- 2,171 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP** (food stamps) in 2011, up from **2,036** children in 2007 (up 6.6%).9
- **64.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 3,760 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$252.24.8


Johnson County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.¹⁰

As a result of participating in **Johnson County Extension** programs:²

- 10 people supplemented their diets with healthy foods they produced or preserved.
- 305 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 200 youth increased healthy food consumption.
