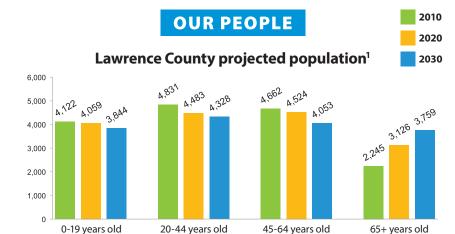


## **OUR FOCUS**

# STIR-FRY YOUR WAY TO HEALTH

nly 13.5 percent of Lawrence Countians reported eating five or more fruits and vegetables per day (CDC, BRFSS). In an effort to promote the health benefits derived from eating fresh fruits and vegetables, the Lawrence County FCS staff taught "Stir-fry Your Way to Better Health," reaching 125 participants. The FCS agent demonstrated stir-fry cooking as an easy method of preparing fresh vegetables for a one-dish nutritious meal. Of the 62 percent of the evaluations returned, 42 percent tried stir-fry at home; 31 percent reported increasing fruit and vegetable consumption by an average of two servings per day; 28 percent visited a local farmers market or local grower; 23 percent requested recipes and 18 percent tried one or more "Plate-It-Up" recipes at home.

# **FAMILY ACCESS**

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Lawrence County...

- 31.8% (+/- 7.9) of families with children were below poverty
- 22.2% (+/- 6.6) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 22.4% (+/- 3.2) of households had retirement income
- 7.1% (+/- 1.8) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas<sup>4</sup> indicates that in 2010. Lawrence County had 1,775 people, 444 children and 257 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.\*

In addition, **1,023** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

#### As a result of participating in Lawrence County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 840 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 130 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 475 people increased leadership knowledge and skills.

# **COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY**

In 2011, Lawrence County had:

- 4 Grocery stores (any kind)<sup>5</sup>
  - 3 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)<sup>5</sup>
  - 1 Convenience store (i.e. food marts no gas)<sup>5</sup>
- 11 Gasoline stations with convenience stores<sup>5</sup>

In the county, there were:

- 1 Roadside market that served the county<sup>6</sup>
- 1 Farmers market location<sup>7</sup>
- 26 SNAP\*\* authorized stores (food stamps)<sup>4</sup>
- 13 WIC\*\*\* authorized stores<sup>4</sup>

In 2011, there were \$326,944.42 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Lawrence County.4

#### As a result of participating in **Lawrence County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 1,250 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 1,000 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 725 people reported eating more healthy foods.

### **FOOD ASSISTANCE**

In Lawrence County...

- 1,426 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP\*\* (food stamps) in 2011, up from **1,417** children in 2007 (up **0.6%**).9
- **67.0**% of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 2,390 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$252.03.8

Lawrence County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.<sup>10</sup>

### As a result of participating in **Lawrence County Extension** programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 1,500 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 2,000 people were reached with information on eating healthy foods.
- 1,750 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
