
#### **OUR FOCUS**



### **SPOTLIGHT ON ...**

## FAMILY FOOD SECURITY

agoffin County is the 24th poorest county in the nation, with a poverty rate of 35.6 percent. Almost half of the county population receives food stamp benefits and emergency food sources are extremely limited, especially after the county's only food pantry was destroyed during the 2012 tornado. Following the disaster, the Magoffin County Extension staff helped to organize a mobile food pantry to assist those impacted by the tornado and provide food assistance to those in need. Through the mobile food pantry, 150 participants received food boxes valued at approximately \$150, as well as nutrition information each month. The Magoffin County Extension Service organized the mobile food pantry through the fall of 2012 until a church accepted the responsibility. That food pantry is still operational, providing better food security for Magoffin County families.



#### **FAMILY ACCESS**

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Magoffin County...

- 35.4% (+/- 9.7) of families with children were below poverty
- 25.9% (+/- 6.6) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 17.2% (+/- 3.4) of households had retirement income
- 12.1% (+/- 3.6) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas<sup>4</sup> indicates that in 2010. Magoffin County had 444 households with no vehicle and low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.\*

#### As a result of participating in Magoffin County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 425 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 300 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 225 people were involved in addressing community issues.

#### **COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY**

In 2011, Magoffin County had:

- 4 Grocery stores (any kind)<sup>5</sup>
  - 2 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)<sup>5</sup>
  - 2 Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)<sup>5</sup>
- 8 Gasoline stations with convenience stores<sup>5</sup>

In the county, there were:

- 1 Roadside markets that served the county<sup>6</sup>
- 0 Farmers market locations<sup>7</sup>
- 28 SNAP\*\* authorized stores (food stamps)<sup>4</sup>
- 11 WIC\*\*\* authorized stores4

In 2011, there were \$215,145.43 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Magoffin County.4

#### As a result of participating in **Magoffin County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 7,000 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 6,500 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **500** people reported eating more healthy foods.

#### **FOOD ASSISTANCE**

In Magoffin County...

- 1,535 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP\*\* (food stamps) in 2011, down from **1,593** children in 2007 (down **3.6%**).9
- **86.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 2,734 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$232.48.8


Magoffin County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.<sup>10</sup>

#### As a result of participating in **Magoffin County Extension** programs:2

- 500 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 5,000 families/caregivers were reached with information on accessing healthy foods.
- 1,200 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
