


#### **OUR FOCUS**

### **SPOTLIGHT ON ...**

## MELT DOWN MERCER COUNTY

The obesity epidemic threatens the quality and years of life for Kentuckians, placing individuals at increased risk for many chronic health conditions. These include type 2 diabetes, heart disease, stroke, and some types of cancers. To promote improved health and wellness, the Mercer County Extension Service staff partnered with various organizations to provide "Melt Down Mercer County," three 10-week programs focusing on healthy consumption of fruits and vegetables balanced with moderate physical activity. The program reached over 200 people, who lost a cumulative 192 pounds. One female participant shared that involvement in the program led to a real change of practice within her entire family. Her son is making healthier snack choices and her waistline has decreased.

### **FAMILY ACCESS**

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Mercer County...

- 15.3% (+/- 5.4) of families with children were below poverty
- 11.0% (+/- 3.3) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 24.7% (+/- 2.2) of households had retirement income
- 5.9% (+/- 1.8) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas<sup>4</sup> indicates that in 2010. Mercer County had 3,906 people, 993 children and 640 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.\*

In addition, **1,455** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

#### As a result of participating in **Mercer County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 1,919 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 168 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 548 people are ready to enter the work force.

#### **COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY**

In 2011, Mercer County had:

- 7 Grocery stores (any kind)<sup>5</sup>
  - 7 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)<sup>5</sup>
  - O Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)<sup>5</sup>
- 8 Gasoline stations with convenience stores<sup>5</sup>

In the county, there were:

- 5 Roadside markets that served the county<sup>6</sup>
- 3 Farmers market locations<sup>7</sup>
- 20 SNAP\*\* authorized stores (food stamps)<sup>4</sup>
- 5 WIC\*\*\* authorized stores<sup>4</sup>

In 2011, there were \$269,606.50 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Mercer County.4

#### As a result of participating in **Mercer County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 61 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- 57 people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling, and preparation of food.
- 47 families spent time together in physical activity.

#### **FOOD ASSISTANCE**

In Mercer County...

- 1,340 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP\*\* (food stamps) in 2011, up from **1,022** children in 2007 (up 31.1%).9
- **50.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 1,747 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$262.62.8


Mercer County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.<sup>10</sup>

#### As a result of participating in Mercer County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 109 people in Plate it Up! Kentucky Proud indicated they are more likely to buy Kentucky produce.
- 275 families/caregivers were reached with information on accessing healthy foods.
- 96 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
