
OUR FOCUS

Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Monroe County. To help families make wise decisions, our educational programs focus on:

- Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices that influence health and well-being
- Nurturing Families as they cope with fewer resources and more demands
- Embracing Life as We Age to strive for independence longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period
- Promoting Healthy Homes and Communities to recycle, reduce waste, and protect our environment
- Accessing Nutritious Food that is affordable, available and safe
- Empowering Community Leaders as we all work to sustain and improve our communities

In 2012-2013, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **13,410** contacts with Monroe County individuals and families.²





SPOTLIGHT ON ...

FARMERS MARKET

Supporting the local food production economy increases consumer access to a safe and healthy food supply for long-term health. The Monroe County Extension Service works together with both producers and consumers to increase fruit and vegetable purchase, preparation, consumption, and preservation of Kentucky-grown and value-added commodities. In the 2012-2013 season, 23 local producers sold at the market, seven of whom were new to the market and two of whom became a certified Home-based Microprocessor this year. The Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program provided 300 low-income senior citizens the opportunity to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables at the farmers market, bringing \$8,400 income to Monroe County producers. One producer reported that the voucher recipients became regular customers of the market, even after their vouchers were redeemed.



FAMILY ACCESS

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Monroe County...

- 29.1% (+/- 8.2) of families with children were below poverty
- 22.3% (+/- 6.1) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 12.1% (+/- 2.5) of households had retirement income
- 10.3% (+/- 2.9) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas⁴ indicates that in 2010, Monroe County had **445** people, **97** children and **84** seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.*

In addition, 278 residents had both low income and low access to stores.

As a result of participating in **Monroe County Extension programs:**²

- 800 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 400 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 175 people were involved in addressing community issues.

COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY

In 2011, Monroe County had:

- 4 Grocery stores (any kind)⁵
 - 4 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)⁵
 - O Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)⁵
- 5 Gasoline stations with convenience stores⁵

In the county, there were:

- 1 Roadside market that served the county⁶
- 1 Farmers market location⁷
- 14 SNAP** authorized stores (food stamps)⁴
- 7 WIC*** authorized stores⁴

In 2011, there were \$333,435.58 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Monroe County.4

As a result of participating in Monroe County Extension programs:²

- 375 people made lifestyle changes to improve
- 500 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 850 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

In Monroe County...

- 956 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP** (food stamps) in 2011, up from **795** children in 2007 (up **20.3%)**.9
- **70.0**% of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 1,380 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$247.99.8


Monroe County is served by Feeding America, Kentucky's Heartland of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.¹⁰

As a result of participating in **Monroe County Extension** programs:²

- 150 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 1,000 families/caregivers were reached with information on accessing healthy foods.
- 700 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
