


#### **OUR FOCUS**

Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Owen County. To help families make wise decisions, our educational programs focus on:

In 2012-2013, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **22,096** contacts with Owen County individuals and families.<sup>2</sup>



### **SPOTLIGHT ON ...**

### FARMERS MARKET PROGRAM

Since 2003, a farm and craft market has provided an outlet for Owen County farmers and crafters. Interest in building community food systems is significant, as more vendors and consumers than ever are participating on a regular basis. Owen County FCS staff features a local commodity at the market each week using "Plate It Up! Kentucky Proud" materials. Vendors report increased sales of the produce featured by FCS staff, confirming consumer survey indicators that 48 percent report using the recipes. Vendors also reported an increase in the use of WIC/Senior Citizen vouchers and estimated seasonal sales of \$30,000. Surveys at the local market showed that 99 percent of the consumers increased their family's consumption of fruits and vegetables as a result of the farmers market.

### **FAMILY ACCESS**

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Owen County...

- 16.4% (+/- 5.6) of families with children were below poverty
- 12.7% (+/- 5.0) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 22.3% (+/- 3.0) of households had retirement income
- 4.1% (+/- 1.4) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas<sup>4</sup> indicates that in 2010. Owen County had **753** people, **194** children and **80** seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.\*

In addition, **187** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

#### As a result of participating in Owen County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 250 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 100 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 200 people in Plate it Up! Kentucky Proud indicated they are more likely to buy Kentucky produce.

#### **COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY**

In 2011, Owen County had:

- 3 Grocery stores (any kind)<sup>5</sup>
  - 3 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)<sup>5</sup>
  - O Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)<sup>5</sup>
- 4 Gasoline stations with convenience stores<sup>5</sup>

In the county, there were:

- 4 Roadside markets that served the county<sup>6</sup>
- 3 Farmers market locations<sup>7</sup>
- 9 SNAP\*\* authorized stores (food stamps)4
- 4 WIC\*\*\* authorized stores4

In 2011, there were \$171,171.50 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Owen County.4

#### As a result of participating in **Owen County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 500 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 200 families spent time together in physical activity.
- 500 people reported eating more healthy foods.

#### **FOOD ASSISTANCE**

In Owen County...

- 823 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP\*\* (food stamps) in 2011, up from **646** children in 2007 (up 27.4%).9
- **60.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 958 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$284.77.8

Owen County is served by Freestore Foodbank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.<sup>10</sup>

#### As a result of participating in **Owen County Extension** programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 400 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 600 families/caregivers were reached with information on accessing healthy foods.
- 900 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
