
OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

PLATE IT UP! KENTUCKY PROUD

Rowan County FCS nutrition education programs focus on helping families access more local foods, stretch food dollars, decrease hunger, and utilize healthy and safe food preparation methods. As part of these efforts, the Rowan County Extension Service staff provided the "Plate it Up! Kentucky Proud" program for a women's health conference. Eighty-five women participated in the workshop. Participants were surveyed following the program and 100 percent indicated they were likely to increase consumption of Kentucky fruits and vegetables. Additionally, 100 percent indicated that they would utilize Kentucky Proud produce and recipes in their home. After participating in the program, 100 percent of participants reported that they planned to increase daily servings of fruits and vegetables.



FAMILY ACCESS

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,³ in Rowan County...

- 31.3% (+/- 6.7) of families with children were below poverty
- 19.5% (+/- 5.4) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 16.3% (+/- 2.4) of households had retirement income
- 7.5% (+/- 2.3) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas⁴ indicates that in 2010. Rowan County had 1,624 people, 250 children and 209 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.*

In addition, **887** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

As a result of participating in **Rowan County Extension programs:**²

- 175 people in Plate it Up! Kentucky Proud indicated they are more likely to buy Kentucky produce.
- 350 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 250 people were involved in addressing community issues.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

In Rowan County...

- 1,655 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP** (food stamps) in 2011, up from 1,363 children in 2007 (up 21.4%).9
- 60.0% of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.⁹
- There were 2,875 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$246.80.8

Rowan County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.¹⁰

As a result of participating in **Rowan County Extension** programs:²

- 360 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 950 people were reached with information on eating healthy foods.
- 725 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.

COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY

In 2011, Rowan County had:

- 6 Grocery stores (any kind)⁵
 - 6 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)⁵
 - O Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)⁵
- 12 Gasoline stations with convenience stores⁵

In the county, there were:

- 1 Roadside market that served the county⁶
- 1 Farmers market location⁷
- 34 SNAP** authorized stores (food stamps)⁴
- 12 WIC*** authorized stores⁴

In 2011, there were \$385,808.70 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Rowan County.⁴

As a result of participating in **Rowan County Extension programs:**²

- 520 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- 910 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 600 families spent time together in physical activity.
