


# **OUR FOCUS**

Family and Consumer Sciences Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Taylor County. To help families make wise decisions, our educational programs focus on:

In 2012-2013, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **13,827** contacts with Taylor County individuals and families.<sup>2</sup>

# TEACHING BASIC COOKING

xtension reaches many audiences when teaching basic cooking skills. In Taylor County, 11 men learned to prepare nutritious food for themselves and their families; 35 adults exhibited skills in food preservation after a three-part workshop series; 68 adults learned new methods of cooking fish safely; and Extension Homemakers adopted skills with herbs, spices and vegetable cookery. An area-wide Living Well Cooking School resulted in 24 participants agreeing to try one or more demonstrated recipes at home and 23 planned to share recipes. Fathers in drug recovery benefitted from Taylor County Family and Consumer Sciences Extension nutrition classes.

#### **FAMILY ACCESS**

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Taylor County...

- 25.0% (+/- 5.6) of families with children were below poverty
- 13.9% (+/- 4.5) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 22.3% (+/- 2.1) of households had retirement income
- 9.6% (+/- 1.9) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas<sup>4</sup> indicates that in 2010. Taylor County had 1,780 people, 400 children and 309 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.\*

In addition, **603** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

#### As a result of participating in **Taylor County Extension programs:**<sup>2</sup>

- 107 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 19 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 201 people were involved in addressing community issues.

# **COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY**

In 2011, Taylor County had:

- 7 Grocery stores (any kind)<sup>5</sup>
  - 7 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)<sup>5</sup>
    - O Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)<sup>5</sup>
- 11 Gasoline stations with convenience stores<sup>5</sup>

In the county, there were:

- 7 Roadside markets that served the county<sup>6</sup>
- 1 Farmers market location<sup>7</sup>
- 31 SNAP\*\* authorized stores (food stamps)<sup>4</sup>
- 14 WIC\*\*\* authorized stores<sup>4</sup>

In 2011, there were \$306,445.85 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Taylor County.4

### As a result of participating in Taylor County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 355 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 79 people implemented practices for safe storage, handling, and preparation of food.
- 626 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.

# **FOOD ASSISTANCE**

In Taylor County...

- 1,890 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP\*\* (food stamps) in 2011, up from **1,277** children in 2007 (up 48.0%).9
- 61.0% of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 2,770 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$246.50.8

Taylor County is served by Feeding America, Kentucky's Heartland of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks. 10

# As a result of participating in **Taylor County Extension** programs:<sup>2</sup>

- 14 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 498 families/caregivers were reached with information on accessing healthy foods.
- 535 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
