
OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

STRETCHING FOOD BUDGETS

The recent economic recession has greatly impacted povertystricken counties in Kentucky. Accessing nutritious food can be difficult when resources are limited and when families struggle to provide basic needs. Given its relationship to hunger and to a family's quality of life, the Whitley County FCS agent developed and implemented a program about food spending, reaching 100 individuals. According to short-term evaluations, most participants learned that store brands are often less expensive than comparable name brand products. In evaluations conducted one month after the lesson, participants reported grocery shopping less frequently when they had an empty stomach and reported fewer impulsive purchases.



FAMILY ACCESS

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,³ in Whitley County...

- 29.8% (+/- 4.7) of families with children were below poverty
- 18.9% (+/- 4.6) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 18.8% (+/- 2.1) of households had retirement income
- 9.3% (+/- 1.8) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas⁴ indicates that in 2010. Whitley County had 4,567 people, 1,073 children and 700 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.*

In addition, 2,269 residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

As a result of participating in Whitley County Extension programs:²

- 200 people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- 337 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 45 people in Taking Control of Your Diabetes utilized a diabetes meal plan.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

In Whitley County...

- 4,238 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP** (food stamps) in 2011, up from **3,799** children in 2007 (up 11.6%).9
- 69.0% of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were 6,036 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$266.52.8

Whitley County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.¹⁰

As a result of participating in **Whitley County Extension** programs:²

- 420 people supplemented their diets with healthy foods they produced or preserved.
- 970 families/caregivers were reached with information on accessing healthy foods.
- 465 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.

COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY

In 2011, Whitley County had:

- 18 Grocery stores (any kind)⁵
 - 13 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)⁵
 - 5 Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)⁵
- 15 Gasoline stations with convenience stores⁵

In the county, there were:

- 1 Roadside market that served the county⁶
- 2 Farmers market locations⁷
- 69 SNAP** authorized stores (food stamps)⁴
- 24 WIC*** authorized stores⁴

In 2011, there were \$412,244.21 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Whitley County.⁴

As a result of participating in Whitley County Extension programs:²

- 1,150 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 260 people implemented practices for safe storage, handling, and preparation of food.
- 508 people reported eating more healthy foods.
