STAND UP TO FALLING

alls are the leading cause of injury and injury-related death among older adults in the United States. Studies show that people can lower their chance of falling, and even prevent falls, if preventable risk factors are addressed. The Ballard County Cooperative Extension Office presented the "Stand Up to Falling" series to 18 participants at the local senior center. A post-event survey found that 100% of the participants now understand how to reduce the risk of falling, 80% plan to protect their vision and/or see an eye doctor, 55% plan to make changes to their home to reduce the risk of falling, 60% plan to review their medications with a doctor or pharmacist, and 55% plan to be more physically active


AVAILABILITY

In 2010, in Ballard County, there were...³

- 727 renter households
- 2,670 homeowner households
- 62 vacant housing units for rent
- 40 vacant housing units for sale

According to the Kentucky Department of Education, in 2012-2013, **41** children were homeless or were precariously housed in Ballard County.4

HEALTH AND SAFETY

In Ballard County, it is estimated that in 2008-2012...²

- half of all renter-occupied housing was built before 1977 (+/-5 years)
- half of all owner-occupied housing was built before 1976 (+/-3 years)

According to 2008-2012 American Community Survey² estimates in Ballard County...

- 0.9% (+/- 0.8) of all households had no landline or cell phone
- 43.4% (+/- 4.9) of workers living in Ballard County worked in Kentucky but outside the county and 7.2% (+/- 2.0) worked outside the state
- Half of all workers traveled **21.0** (+/- 1.8) or more minutes to work

AFFORDABILITY


According to American Community Survey estimates for Ballard County, in 2008-2012...²

- **30.0%** (+/- 8.7) of renter households paid **35%** or more of their income for rent and utilities
- 14.9% (+/- 4.1) of homeowner households with a mortgage and 6.5% (+/- 3.1) of homeowner households without a mortgage paid 35% or more of their income for housing costs
- 43.9% (+/- 3.9) of homeowner households did not have a mortgage
- 14.9% (+/- 2.6) of all housing units were mobile homes

According to the most recent poverty estimates, in 2012, **16.6%** (+/- 3.3) of residents in the county were living below poverty.5

In 2013, residents needed to earn \$10.87 an hour (or work 1.5 iobs at \$7.25 an hour**) to afford a twobedroom apartment at Fair Market Rent in Ballard County.6
