VIRTUAL DEMENTIA TOUR

ive million Americans have Alzheimer's disease. Diagnosed in someone every 68 seconds, the disease is the sixth-leading cause of death and the only disease that continues to increase and has not been cured or prevented. Henry County Extension Service collaborated with Second Wind Dreams and UK's Work Life Program to offer the Virtual Dementia Tour to 26 employees of Providence New Castle, a long-term care facility. Through the Virtual Dementia Tour, employees experienced some of the physical and mental challenges faced by elderly individuals with memory loss. The tour is designed to improve communication and care. Upon completion, caregivers were able to identify with and understand the behaviors and needs of those in their care. They reported being profoundly impacted.


AVAILABILITY

In 2010, in Henry County, there were...³

- 1,508 renter households
- 4,455 homeowner households
- 135 vacant housing units for rent
- 119 vacant housing units for sale

According to the Kentucky Department of Education, in 2012-2013, 112 children were homeless or were precariously housed in Henry County.4

HEALTH AND SAFETY

In Henry County, it is estimated that in 2008-2012...²

- half of all renter-occupied housing was built before 1973 (+/-3 years)
- half of all owner-occupied housing was built before 1982 (+/-3 years)

According to 2008-2012 American Community Survey² estimates in Henry County...

- 3.6% (+/- 1.0) of all households had no landline or cell phone
- 62.4% (+/- 3.6) of workers living in Henry County worked in Kentucky but outside the county and 2.4% (+/- 1.3) worked outside the state
- Half of all workers traveled **29.0** (+/- 1.7) or more minutes to work

AFFORDABILITY


According to American Community Survey estimates for Henry County, in 2008-2012...²

- 47.9% (+/- 8.9) of renter households paid 35% or more of their income for rent and utilities
- 25.1% (+/- 4.4) of homeowner households with a mortgage and 13.5% (+/- 5.6) of homeowner households without a mortgage paid 35% or more of their income for housing costs
- 37.0% (+/- 3.1) of homeowner households did not have a mortgage
- 18.0% (+/- 2.5) of all housing units were mobile homes

According to the most recent poverty estimates, in 2012, **16.7%** (+/- 3.2) of residents in the county were living below poverty.5

In 2013, residents needed to earn \$13.56 an hour (or work 1.9 iobs at \$7.25 an hour**) to afford a twobedroom apartment at Fair Market Rent in Henry County.6
