SPOTLIGHT ON ...

DIABETES EDUCATION AND SUPPORT GROUP

he rate of adult diabetes in Kentucky is at an all-time high of 10.7%, and an additional 233,000 adults have prediabetes. The Family and Consumer Sciences agent is a member of the Lawrence County Community/Health Action Team. One focus of this team is health issues related to diabetes. Funding from the Appalachian Regional Commission and a Marshall University Diabetes Grant, totaling \$160,000 over a fouryear period, funded the creation of a diabetes support group. Diabetes education was provided monthly. Evaluations showed that 50% of participants have made beneficial dietary changes, increased physical activity, achieved weight loss, and lowered A1-C levels.


AVAILABILITY

In 2010, in Lawrence County, there were...³

- 1,557 renter households
- 4,682 homeowner households
- 149 vacant housing units for rent
- 47 vacant housing units for sale

According to the Kentucky Department of Education, in 2012-2013, 618 children were homeless or were precariously housed in Lawrence County.4

HEALTH AND SAFETY

In Lawrence County, it is estimated that in 2008-2012...²

- half of all renter-occupied housing was built before 1975 (+/-5 years)
- half of all owner-occupied housing was built before 1982 (+/-2 years)

According to 2008-2012 American Community Survey² estimates in Lawrence County...

- 3.4% (+/- 1.3) of all households had no landline or cell phone
- 31.1% (+/- 4.6) of workers living in Lawrence County worked in Kentucky but outside the county and 13.1% (+/-3.4) worked outside the state
- Half of all workers traveled **33.8** (+/- 3.5) or more minutes to work

AFFORDABILITY


According to American Community Survey estimates for Lawrence County, in 2008-2012...²

- 45.5% (+/- 9.3) of renter households paid 35% or more of their income for rent and utilities
- 24.5% (+/- 6.0) of homeowner households with a mortgage and 8.9% (+/- 3.8) of homeowner households without a mortgage paid 35% or more of their income for housing costs
- 54.0% (+/- 3.6) of homeowner households did not have a mortgage
- **29.8%** (+/- 3.4) of all housing units were mobile homes

According to the most recent poverty estimates, in 2012, **25.3%** (+/- 4.2) of residents in the county were living below poverty.⁵

In 2013, residents needed to earn \$10.87 an hour (or work 1.5 iobs at \$7.25 an hour**) to afford a twobedroom apartment at Fair Market Rent in Lawrence County.6
