REDUCING ENERGY COSTS

hen the local electricity provider indicated there would be a significant increase in electric rates, the Meade County Family and Consumer Sciences agent educated consumers on saving money by reducing energy waste. A series of handouts and displays on energy savings were presented at the county fair and electric coop meeting, as well as in articles in newsletters and newspapers. Over 7,000 consumers received information on caulking windows, selecting energy-saving appliances, planting trees, using adjustable thermometers, and other practices designed to reduce overall energy costs. One consumer said, "I had no idea my old refrigerator was using that much electric. I have been putting off buying one, but now I can justify the cost."


AVAILABILITY

In 2010, in Meade County, there were...³

- 2,931 renter households
- 7,540 homeowner households
- 435 vacant housing units for rent
- 147 vacant housing units for sale

According to the Kentucky Department of Education, in 2012-2013, **9** children were homeless or were precariously housed in Meade County.4

HEALTH AND SAFETY

In Meade County, it is estimated that in 2008-2012...²

- half of all renter-occupied housing was built before 1975 (+/-5 years)
- half of all owner-occupied housing was built before 1984 (+/-2 years)

According to 2008-2012 American Community Survey² estimates in Meade County...

- 1.6% (+/- 0.7) of all households had no landline or cell phone
- 60.2% (+/- 3.0) of workers living in Meade County worked in Kentucky but outside the county and **6.7**% (+/- 1.3) worked outside the state
- Half of all workers traveled **32.1** (+/- 2.3) or more minutes to work

AFFORDABILITY

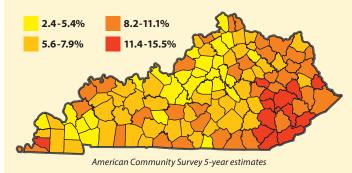
According to American Community Survey estimates for Meade County, in 2008-2012...²

- **32.7%** (+/- 6.2) of renter households paid **35%** or more of their income for rent and utilities
- 23.0% (+/- 4.3) of homeowner households with a mortgage and 4.8% (+/- 2.7) of homeowner households without a mortgage paid 35% or more of their income for housing costs
- 36.1% (+/- 3.7) of homeowner households did not have a mortgage
- 20.1% (+/- 3.0) of all housing units were mobile homes

According to the most recent poverty estimates, in 2012, **16.2%** (+/- 2.9) of residents in the county were living below poverty.5

In 2013, residents needed to earn \$12.23 an hour (or work 1.7 iobs at \$7.25 an hour**) to afford a twobedroom apartment at Fair Market Rent in Meade County.6
