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
OUR FOCUS

Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Casey County. To help Kentuckians strengthen their financial, physical, and social well-being, our educational programs focus on:

SPOTLIGHT ON...

GREEN CLEANING MEANS SAVINGS

reat Green Spring Clean participants learned about healthy home environments; green and environmentally friendly recipes for home cleaning and laundry products; safety; saving money; and budgeting. Participants said they were better informed; used green practices in their homes; were more energy efficient; used green cleaning and laundry recipes; saved money on home cleaning and laundry products; and shared information with neighbors and family. Participants said the recipes cleaned better than brand-name cleaners and detergents. They saved an average of \$25 per month on household cleaning and laundry products, with annual savings of \$300 per household.

FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Casey County, the median household income in 2013 was **\$29,303** (+/- **\$2,397**) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.3

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 34.5% (+/-7.9) of families with related children were below poverty
- 22.0% (+/-5.7) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 5.6% (+/-2.6) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 66.5% of students were eligible for free lunches and 5.9% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-20155

As a result of participating in Casey County Extension programs: 1

- 793 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-making.
- 392 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Casey County in 2012:6

- 12.3% (15.9%-9.4%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 36.3% (42.6%-30.3%) of adults 18 years and over were obese
- 33.2% (39.5%-26.8%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Casey County:⁷

- 40.3% (52.5%-29.3%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with high blood pressure
- 25.5% (32.4%-19.7%) of adults reported fair or poor health

In Casey County:

- 32.8% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state8
- 44.9% (+/-7.4) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)8
- 12 deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-20139

As a result of participating in Casey County Extension programs: 1

- 971 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 294 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

SOCIAL WELL-BEING

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Casey County:4

- 31.2% (+/-1.9) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 301 (+/-140) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- **62.1%** (+/-**11.6**) of children under 6 years and **57.6%** (+/-10.4) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor force
- 527 (+/-214) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 1,211 (+/-172) civilian veterans lived in Casey County⁴


In Casey County:

- 19.3% (26.6%-13.6%) of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-127
- 57 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013¹⁰
- 47.4% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election¹¹

As a result of participating in Casey County Extension programs:1

- 159 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 811 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
