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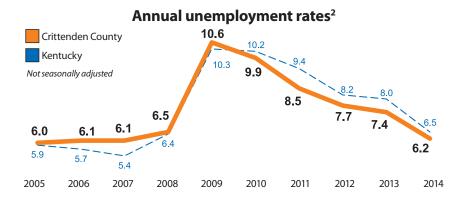
OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON...

EFNEP MAKES POSITIVE CHANGES

The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) in Crittenden County teaches limited-resource mothers with young children skills to improve the nutritional quality of meals, safely prepare meals, and boost food-related resources. Of the 59 EFNEP graduate families, 98% showed a positive change in their eating habits as a result of learning and building skills and behaviors taught through EFNEP. Behavior checklists completed before and after the program showed that 80% now plan their family meals and 92% read Nutrition Facts on food labels.

FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Crittenden County, the median household income in 2013 was **\$37,372** (+/- **\$3,659**) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.3

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 19.3% (+/-6.4) of families with related children were below poverty
- 20.3% (+/-5.4) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 5.2% (+/-2.2) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 52.4% of students were eligible for free lunches and 3.2% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-20155

As a result of participating in Crittenden County Extension programs: 1

- 126 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-making.
- 301 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Crittenden County in 2012:6

- 12.8% (16.5%-9.6%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 31.7% (38.8%-25.3%) of adults 18 years and over were obese
- 31.3% (38.6%-24.6%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Crittenden County:⁷

- 43.9% (58.7%-30.1%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with high blood pressure
- 30.3% (40.3%-22.0%) of adults reported fair or poor health

In Crittenden County:

- 18.5% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state8
- 36.3% (+/-7.6) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)8
- **0-9** deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-2013⁹

As a result of participating in Crittenden County Extension programs: 1

- 109 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 165 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

SOCIAL WELL-BEING

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Crittenden County:4

- 33.8% (+/-1.9) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 165 (+/-120) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- 45.8% (+/-13.9) of children under 6 years and 51.0% (+/-10.2) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor force
- 665 (+/-216) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 848 (+/-150) civilian veterans lived in Crittenden County⁴

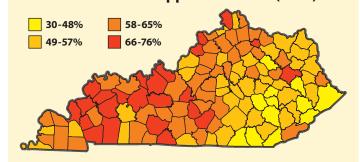
In Crittenden County:

- 18.6% (27.3%-12.2%) of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-127
- 49 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013¹⁰
- 51.1% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election¹¹

As a result of participating in Crittenden County Extension programs: 1

- 150 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 165 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
