
OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON...

BOOSTING VOUCHER REDEMPTION AT FARMERS' MARKET

A fter redemption of senior and WIC farmers' market vouchers decreased in 2013, farmers decided to add a more accessible market location in downtown Maysville. Partnering with the Mason County Health Department, the FCS program offered education about produce at the farmers' market that corresponds with voucher distribution. This effort was designed to not only increase the WIC and senior voucher redemption rate but also to teach those individuals how to pick out the best produce and prepare it and to emphasize the importance of buying local and the value of eating fresh. Since this new initiative began, WIC voucher redemption increased from 36% to 55%.

FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Mason County, the median household income in 2013 was \$42,329 (+/- \$2,821) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.3

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 23.2% (+/-5.5) of families with related children were below poverty
- 10.9% (+/-3.3) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 6.0% (+/-2.3) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 56.3% of students were eligible for free lunches and 5.6% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-20155

As a result of participating in Mason County Extension programs: 1

- 6 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-
- 810 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Mason County in 2012:6

- 14.7% (17.4%-12.2%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 33.6% (38.3%-29.1%) of adults 18 years and over were obese
- 30.4% (34.8%-26.5%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Mason County:7

- 33.8% (40.4%-27.8%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with high blood pressure
- 20.1% (23.6%-17.1%) of adults reported fair or poor health

In Mason County:

- 60.4% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state8
- 24.4% (+/-4.4) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)8
- 13 deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-20139

As a result of participating in Mason County Extension programs: 1

- 445 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 597 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

SOCIAL WELL-BEING

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Mason County:4

- 27.7% (+/-1.7) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 190 (+/-108) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- **73.4%** (+/-**9.0**) of children under 6 years and **70.4%** (+/-**7.0**) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor
- 544 (+/-215) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 1,165 (+/-145) civilian veterans lived in Mason County⁴


In Mason County:

- 19.2% (24.7%-14.6%) of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-127
- 158 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013¹⁰
- 45.2% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election¹¹

As a result of participating in Mason County Extension programs: 1

- 471 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 392 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
