
## **OUR FOCUS**

# HOMEMAKERS LEARN SIGNS OF ALZHEIMER'S

Now the 10 Signs: Early Detection Matters was the most frequent educational program request by the Licking River Area Homemakers. The Menifee County FCS agent traveled to six area counties to teach the one-hour Alzheimer's Association presentation to 33 homemakers. The interactive workshop shows how early detection helps people receive proper care and treatment. Of 28 homemakers surveyed, 68% learned more about the signs and treatment of Alzheimer's disease, 73% planned to teach the lesson to their club, and 67% planned to share information with their friends and family. All said the program was useful.

### FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Menifee County, the median household income in 2013 was **\$30,047** (+/- **\$2,399**) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.3

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 33.8% (+/-8.5) of families with related children were below poverty
- 19.6% (+/-8.5) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 3.6% (+/-2.5) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 75.1% of students were eligible for free lunches and 3.6% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-2015<sup>5</sup>

#### As a result of participating in Menifee County Extension programs: 1

- 292 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-making.
- 412 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

#### PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Menifee County in 2012:6

- 12.6% (15.7%-9.8%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 33.3% (39.2%-27.6%) of adults 18 years and over were obese
- 28.7% (34.3%-23.4%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Menifee County:7

- 45.1% (56.2%-34.5%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with high blood pressure
- 31.6% (38.3%-25.7%) of adults reported fair or poor health

In Menifee County:

- 88.6% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state8
- 53.0% (+/-12.9) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)8
- 11 deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-20139

#### As a result of participating in Menifee County Extension programs: 1

- 60 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 60 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

### **SOCIAL WELL-BEING**

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Menifee County:4

- 25.3% (+/-4.8) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 172 (+/-104) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- 64.0% (+/-18.8) of children under 6 years and 63.6% (+/-12.0) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor force
- 188 (+/-142) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 478 (+/-136) civilian veterans lived in Menifee County<sup>4</sup>


#### In Menifee County:

- 27.8% (36.6%-20.5%) of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-127
- 51 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013<sup>10</sup>
- 52.0% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election<sup>11</sup>

#### As a result of participating in Menifee County Extension programs:1

- 44 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 60 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
