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
OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON...

PUTTING FOOD PRESERVATION TO WORK

Eleven people attended a food preservation workshop in Ohio County. Two had never preserved any type of food, and after completing the workshop they put what they learned into practice. All who took the class learned something new, including those who had been canning for years. An experienced canner intends to share updates on food preservation safety with family and friends. At the end of the summer, four participants reported that they had canned, frozen, and dried many fruits and vegetables and had made jams, jellies, and pickles.

FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Ohio County, the median household income in 2013 was **\$40,622** (+/- **\$2,650**) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.3

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 24.3% (+/-4.5) of families with related children were below poverty
- 13.4% (+/-3.8) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 3.9% (+/-1.5) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 57.4% of students were eligible for free lunches and 6.8% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-2015⁵

As a result of participating in Ohio County Extension programs: 1

- 1,238 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-making.
- 2,520 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Ohio County in 2012:6

- 15.0% (18.4%-11.8%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 40.0% (46.3%-34.2%) of adults 18 years and over were obese
- 34.1% (40.0%-28.6%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Ohio County:7

- 34.5% (43.3%-26.6%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with high blood pressure
- 28.4% (34.2%-23.2%) of adults reported fair or poor health

In Ohio County:

- 15.4% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state8
- 29.4% (+/-4.2) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)8
- 19 deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-20139

As a result of participating in Ohio County Extension programs: 1

- 341 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 2,081 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

SOCIAL WELL-BEING

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Ohio County:4

- 29.0% (+/-1.6) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 343 (+/-145) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- 43.6% (+/-8.5) of children under 6 years and 55.7% (+/-6.2) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor force
- 481 (+/-188) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 1,717 (+/-214) civilian veterans lived in Ohio County⁴


In Ohio County:

- 17.4% (24.0%-12.3%) of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-127
- 108 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013¹⁰
- 53.3% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election¹¹

As a result of participating in Ohio County Extension programs: 1

- 38 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 2,081 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
