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
OUR FOCUS

Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) Extension is committed to improving the health and well-being of individuals and families in Owen County. To help Kentuckians strengthen their financial, physical, and social well-being, our educational programs focus on:

- Nurturing Families as they cope with fewer resources and more demands
- Embracing Life as We Age to live independently longer
- Securing Financial Stability in a turbulent economic period

In 2014-2015, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **26,243** contacts with Owen County individuals and families.¹

SPOTLIGHT ON...

PROGRAMS IMPROVE OUALITY OF LIFE

In 2010, the median household income in Owen County was \$41,009. The financial stability of our 4,601 households depends on families being able to manage the basic human needs of food, clothing, and shelter. FCS programs have helped meet the needs of families by providing educational information that will improve our citizens' quality of life. WIC and senior voucher recipients have used the farmers' market with over 90% vouchers redeemed, which indicates an increase in consumption. Basic skills taught through FCS programs such as food preparation, baking, food safety, and food preservation help families improve access to food and stretch food dollars.

FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Owen County, the median household income in 2013 was **\$42,134** (+/- **\$4,106**) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.3

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 20.2% (+/-6.5) of families with related children were below poverty
- 11.0% (+/-5.0) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 1.7% (+/-1.6) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 56.8% of students were eligible for free lunches and 3.6% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-20155

As a result of participating in Owen County Extension programs: 1

- 360 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-making.
- 700 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Owen County in 2012:6

- 10.9% (14.4%-7.9%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 31.5% (38.8%-24.8%) of adults 18 years and over were
- 36.0% (43.7%-28.4%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Owen County:7

• 20.1% (29.3%-13.3%) of adults reported fair or poor health

In Owen County:

- 33.8% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state8
- 43.3% (+/-6.9) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)8
- 11 deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-20139

As a result of participating in Owen County Extension programs: 1

- 1,963 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 620 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

SOCIAL WELL-BEING

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Owen County:4

- 26.8% (+/-1.8) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 36 (+/-37) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- 56.3% (+/-13.2) of children under 6 years and 71.0% (+/-10.4) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor force
- 91 (+/-71) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 678 (+/-124) civilian veterans lived in Owen County⁴


In Owen County:

- 21.9% (35.2%-12.6%) of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-127
- 32 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013¹⁰
- 52.3% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election¹¹

As a result of participating in Owen County Extension programs: 1

- 54 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 640 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
