
## **OUR FOCUS**

# HERITAGE SKILLS CAN SUPPLEMENT INCOME

With the loss of coal-related jobs, many families need to supplement their income. To address this issue, the FCS agent taught heritage skills workshops, which encouraged people to pass down skills to the next generation. The workshops included quilting, knitting, crochet, tatting, rug making, Swedish weaving, embroidery, and broomstick lace. Participants learned to make items for personal use, as gifts, and for sale at craft fairs. Past participants have sold items that they learned to make at the workshops and the workshops have helped some participants supplement their family income by using the skills they learned.

## FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Perry County, the median household income in 2013 was **\$32,300** (+/- **\$2,924**) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.3

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 29.1% (+/-5.0) of families with related children were below poverty
- 17.7% (+/-4.2) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 2.3% (+/-1.1) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 68.4% of students were eligible for free lunches and 4.6% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-20155

#### As a result of participating in Perry County Extension programs:1

- 615 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-making.
- 805 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

## PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Perry County in 2012:6

- 13.5% (16.2%-11.2%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 38.0% (42.2%-33.8%) of adults 18 years and over were obese
- 36.0% (40.5%-31.7%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Perry County:7

- 48.7% (55.3%-42.1%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with high blood pressure
- 35.8% (40.0%-31.7%) of adults reported fair or poor health

#### In Perry County:

- 60.7% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state8
- 24.5% (+/-4.7) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)8
- 68 deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-20139

#### As a result of participating in Perry County Extension programs: 1

- 3,654 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 3,654 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

## **SOCIAL WELL-BEING**

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Perry County:4

- 26.2% (+/-1.2) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 547 (+/-196) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- 41.8% (+/-10.0) of children under 6 years and 64.6% (+/-**7.6**) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor
- 287 (+/-109) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 1,563 (+/-241) civilian veterans lived in Perry County<sup>4</sup>


#### In Perry County:

- 26.5% (31.8%-21.8%) of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-127
- 206 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013<sup>10</sup>
- 48.0% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election<sup>11</sup>

#### As a result of participating in Perry County Extension programs: 1

- 5 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 3,862 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
