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
OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON...

GETTING THE GOODS ON GLUTEN

People are aware of gluten. Whether they have gluten intolerance, celiac disease, or are just following the gluten-free trend, many are unaware that gluten is not harmful to everyone and that gluten-free foods are high in fat. A lesson about gluten-free products educated participants about what gluten is, where it is found, the difference between gluten intolerance and celiac disease, and the increased cost of gluten-free products. Surveys showed that most participants learned that gluten should only be avoided if it's harmful, that the cost of gluten-free products is twice that of regular products, and that a gluten-free diet is not a well-balanced diet.

FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Spencer County, the median household income in 2013 was **\$66,711** (+/- **\$4,145**) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.3

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 6.1% (+/-3.0) of families with related children were below poverty
- 10.0% (+/-4.5) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 0.5% (+/-0.5) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 40.6% of students were eligible for free lunches and 5.5% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-20155

As a result of participating in Spencer County Extension programs: 1

- 1,950 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-making.
- 2,550 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Spencer County in 2012:6

- 11.0% (14.8%-7.8%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 27.3% (34.2%-20.8%) of adults 18 years and over were
- 30.0% (38.4%-22.2%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Spencer County:7

• 15.6% (25.3%-9.2%) of adults reported fair or poor health

In Spencer County:

- 68.1% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state8
- 62.8% (+/-7.4) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)8
- 12 deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-20139

As a result of participating in Spencer County Extension programs: 1

- 3,900 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 1,750 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

SOCIAL WELL-BEING

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Spencer County:4

- 21.8% (+/-1.6) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 244 (+/-145) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- 71.1% (+/-11.3) of children under 6 years and 84.9% (+/-6.0) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor force
- 394 (+/-190) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 1,316 (+/-206) civilian veterans lived in Spencer County⁴


In Spencer County:

- 44 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013¹⁰
- 57.0% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election¹¹

As a result of participating in Spencer County Extension programs: 1

- 350 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 3,800 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
