

OUR FOCUS



SPOTLIGHT ON...

WORKING WITH FARMERS' MARKETS

E ach year, the FCS agent meets with potential vendors of the local farmers' market to discuss market rules and guidelines and how vendors can best promote their products. The agent also promotes farmers' participation in the WIC and seniors Farmers Market Nutrition Programs. This year the FCS agent trained five vendors for GAP diplomas, had five become certified to provide samples, and worked with the Trigg County ANR agent to set up a booth to promote Extension and healthy eating. Plate It Up! Kentucky Proud recipes were handed out as well as recipes, newsletters, gardening booklets, and SNAP incentives.



FINANCIAL WELL-BEING

In Trigg County, the median household income in 2013 was \$43,416 (+/- \$4,250) compared to \$43,307 (+/- \$631) for the state.³

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013:4

- 18.4% (+/-6.5) of families with related children were below poverty
- 8.5% (+/-3.4) of people age 65 and over were below poverty
- 3.9% (+/-1.9) of individuals working full time/full year in the previous 12 months were below poverty
- 52.6% of students were eligible for free lunches and 6.5% were eligible for reduced-price lunches in 2014-2015⁵

As a result of participating in Trigg County Extension programs:¹

- 650 people demonstrated informed and effective decision-making.
- 143 people demonstrated increased practical living skills.

PHYSICAL WELL-BEING

According to the CDC's County Diabetes Atlas, in Trigg County in 2012:6

- 12.8% (16.4%-9.8%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with diabetes
- 28.7% (34.5%-23.2%) of adults 18 years and over were obese
- 29.8% (36.0%-24.0%) of adults reported no leisure-time exercise in the past month

Between 2006-2012 in Trigg County:⁷

- 36.8% (48.6%-26.4%) of adults reported having been diagnosed with high blood pressure
- 25.5% (32.3%-19.7%) of adults reported fair or poor health

In Trigg County:

- 62.0% had adequate access to locations for physical activity compared to 72.0% for the state⁸
- 34.4% (+/-6.4) of those who drive to work on their own have a commute that is more than 30 minutes (2009-2013)⁸
- 0-9 deaths were from a drug overdose between 2009-2013⁹

As a result of participating in Trigg County Extension programs:¹

- 310 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- 425 children and youth learned to eat more healthy food.

SOCIAL WELL-BEING

The American Community Survey estimates that between 2009-2013 in Trigg County:⁴

- 33.1% (+/-1.8) of households included one or more persons age 65 and over
- 179 (+/-114) grandparents lived with and were responsible for their own grandchildren
- 61.8% (+/-18.8) of children under 6 years and 70.0% (+/-9.6) of children 6-17 years had all parents in the labor force
- 910 (+/-309) of those age 5 and older spoke a language other than English at home
- 1,650 (+/-197) civilian veterans lived in Trigg County⁴


In Trigg County:

- 20.7% (29.5%-14.1%) of adults ages 18+ reported they did not receive sufficient social-emotional support between 2006-127
- 50 children were determined to have been victims of child abuse or neglect in 2013¹⁰
- 47.7% of those registered to vote did so in the 2014 General Election¹¹

As a result of participating in **Trigg County Extension programs:**¹

- 100 adults reported increased leadership skills, knowledge or confidence.
- 228 people were reached with information related to health and safety.
