

INTERACTING WITH SOMEONE WITH CANCER FACILITATOR'S GUIDE

PURPOSE/BACKGROUND

Knowing what to say to someone who has been diagnosed with cancer can be hard. Talking to someone with cancer often creates fears of saying something inappropriate or making the person upset. As a result, many people talk in whispers or opt to say nothing at all. This lesson will provide tips on proper communication and interaction with someone living with cancer.

TARGET AUDIENCE

People of all ages and abilities who have been touched by cancer are encouraged to attend this lesson.

OPTIMAL GROUP SIZE

This lesson can accommodate both small and large groups as well as in-person or virtual audiences, including a hybrid of face-to-face and virtual.

ESTIMATED PROGRAM TIME

15 to 60 minutes, depending on group discussion

LESSON OBJECTIVES

Because of this program, participants will identify:

- personal fears and uneasiness related to cancer,
- appropriate things to say to someone living with cancer, and
- appropriate things to do for someone living with cancer.

PLAN FOR THE PROGRAM

This lesson highlights ways in which personal fears and values can silence cancer. We highlight tips to help participants speak from their heart and treat those living with the disease "normally." The lesson materials and presentation plan are straightforward. The PowerPoint presentation includes slides and a script with information adapted from the

American Cancer Society and the Cancer Treatment Centers of America. The slides serve as a visual aide and the "notes" section of the presentation includes a script that will help presenters with content delivery and ideas for group discussion and audience participation. To supplement the presentation, the American Cancer Society has a resource guide that you can order and distribute to participants. A post-lesson evaluation aims to measure program satisfaction, knowledge, and behavior intentions. A three-month follow-up evaluation helps to assess behavior change. In addition, the lesson includes a supplemental Extension publication.

 Develop plan for online implementation (e.g. Zoom, Facebook Live, Google Classroom including an online registration procedure. Market the lesson and share log-in information with interested and registered individuals. Email or mail the publication and any other necessary handouts. Establish whether an online survey is required for the evaluation or if paper copies will be mailed and returned.
PROGRAM PROCEDURE
 □ Welcome audience. Introduce yourself and thank everyone for coming. □ Remind participants to sign-in on the attendance and evaluation follow-up roster. □ Distribute program handouts (PowerPoint, publications, and resource guide if you have it □ Begin the PowerPoint presentation, and follow the lesson script and discussion. □ Hand out the post-lesson evaluation, instruct participants to complete the evaluation. Allow approximately 5 to 10 minutes.
*Extension specialists Norman-Burgdolf, Kostelic, Ashurst, and Jones will analyze data and distribute county reports
