Before that time, she spent many hours with her grandmother learning to sew.

Many of her students have been winners of blue ribbons at the Kentucky State Fair. #### **National Sewing Month**

Did you know that an official proclamation was made by President Ronald Reagan on September 29, 1988 proclaiming September as National Sewing Month? In recognition of the importance of home sewing to the United States, the Congress, by House Joint Resolution 580, authorized and requested the President to issue this proclamation.

The importance of sewing is no secret to our program. In a recent clinical study commissioned by the Home Sewing Association (HSA), it was revealed that women who sew - both skilled as well as novice sewers – experience a significant drop in heart rate, blood pressure, and perspiration rate when compared to women who participate in other leisure-time activities. Heart rate, blood pressure, and perspiration rate are three key factors in the measurement of stress. The study's results appear to indicate that sewing helps women to relax while they focus on a creative activity. The five pastimes tested were playing a card game, painting at an easel, reading a newspaper, playing a hand-held video game, and sewing a simple project. The study surprisingly showed that of the five activities, sewing was the only activity where heart rate decreased. In the other four activities, including reading the newspaper, all participants showed an increase in heart rate while engaging in the activity!

### °DOROTHY DO RIGHT°

#### When sewing with knits:

- Choose a pattern designed for knits.
- Remember that knits have different amounts of stretch.
- Use the "pick-a-knit" ruler to determine the amount of stretch required for a particular pattern.
- Remember that most of the time there is less lengthwise stretch than crosswise stretch.
- Use ribbing, binding, or turnedand-stitched neckline finishes.
- Preshrink fabric, interfacing, and zipper.
- Do not preshrink ribbing.
- Use a "with nap" cutting layout.
- To stabilize buttonholes use:
  - tricot interfacing
  - · water soluble stabilizer
  - cord
  - in ribbing, stitch parallel to ribs.
- Use ballpoint pins.
- Pin pattern to sheer or slippery knit with a layer of tissue paper underneath.

- Use sharp scissors for cutting.
- Turn tricot interfacing crosswise.
- Lengthen machine stitch (8 to10 stitches per inch) to prevent rippling.
- Serged or double-stitched seams work well (sew on seamline then 1//8 to ¼ inch away)
- Because knits do not ravel, no seam finish may be needed.
- Use fusible interfacing to stabilize the area under the zipper.


Now you have the knitty-gritty on sewing with knits. Enjoy the next knit garment.
