
- **Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices** that influence health and well-being

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **9,257** contacts with Casey County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

Casey County's illiteracy rate is 42.6% and ranks 93rd out of the 120 Kentucky counties for overall health risk. Studies show early intervention is key to making positive changes in attitudes, behaviors and healthy life-style choices. The LEAP Program, (Literacy, Eating, and Activity for Preschoolers) was implemented in four local Head Start programs and a kindergarten class. Seventy-one preschoolers, fifteen kindergarteners, their parents, and teachers participated in an eight-week program addressing positive early literacy, nutrition, and physical activity. Fourteen students were limited-English speaking. Parents reported they were reading more frequently with their children and had made some positive nutrition changes to meal choices. Teachers reported students had gained an active interest in snack time and were trying new healthier foods.

OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Casey County with their own children...

- **69.1%** are husband-wife families
- **30.9%** are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- **6,351** households
- **1,953** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- **344** grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **1,926** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Casey County Extension programs:²

- **700** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **85** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **450** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Casey County was **\$27,247**.³

The number of children in poverty in Casey County was **1,553** compared to **1,435** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Casey County is **4,125** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Casey County Extension programs:²

- **245** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **520** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **200** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Casey County it is estimated that...


- **45.3%** (+/- **5.3**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **66.7%** (+/- **14.1**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **24.8%** (+/- **5.6**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Casey County Extension programs:²

- **110** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **79** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **500** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
