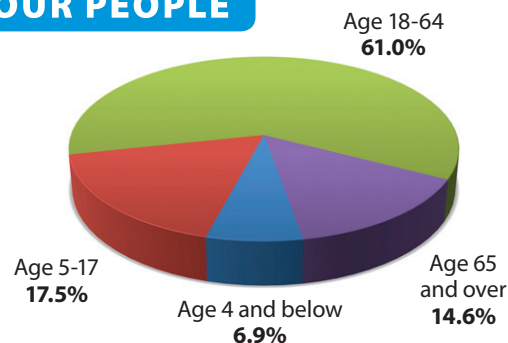
- **Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices** that influence health and well-being

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **37,543** contacts with Daviess County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

Daviess County Family and Consumer Sciences agent partnered with River Valley Behavioral Health and Kentucky Wesleyan College to present a twelve-week program called "Healthy Habits, Healthy Kids" to address issues influencing overweight and obesity. Held in an Owensboro Public School System elementary school, Healthy Habits, Healthy Kids program offered physical activity, group and individual counseling, and nutrition lessons. The project focused on three key factors that affect obesity: good nutritional choices, exercise, and attitudes. Youth were taught to make healthy food choices and importance of daily exercise. Results show that body fat percentages of boys ages 7-10 dropped from 37.6 to 28.3 and body fat of girls ages 8-10 dropped from 36.2 to 29.9.

OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Daviess County with their own children...

- **65.6%** are husband-wife families
- **34.4%** are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- **38,619** households
- **12,477** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- **1,726** grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **10,015** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Daviess County Extension programs:²

- **642** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **134** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **210** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Daviess County was **\$43,031**.³

The number of children in poverty in Daviess County was **5,045** compared to **4,380** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Daviess County is **15,954** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Daviess County Extension programs:²

- **233** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **1,312** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **310** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Daviess County it is estimated that...

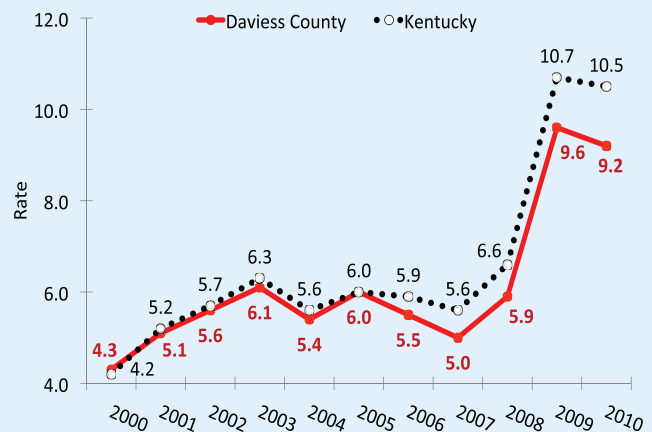
- **52.8%** (+/- **2.3**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **61.5%** (+/- **4.9**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **10%** (+/- **2.3**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Daviess County Extension programs:²

- **46** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **111** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **457** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
