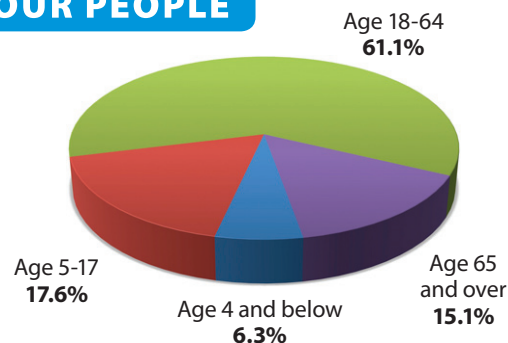
- **Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices** that influence health and well-being

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **5,753** contacts with Grayson County individuals and families.²

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

MAKING HEALTHY LIFESTYLE CHOICES

All nine prekindergarten classes in Grayson County participated in Literacy, Eating, and Activity for Preschoolers (LEAP). During 10 lessons, 180 children ages 3 to 5 were introduced to new foods. Grayson County Family and Consumer Sciences agent read a book and discussed concepts such as colors, shapes, and names of fruits and vegetables, to encourage critical thinking skills. Many children were developmentally delayed and needed encouragement to participate in physical activity, which taught coordination. Toward the end, more children were dancing and playing games. Teachers reported that children began eating more fruits and vegetables offered by school food service. At least 10 children who brought food from home began to consume more fruit and less candy and soft drinks.

OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,¹ of families in Grayson County with their own children...

- **70.8%** are husband-wife families
- **29.2%** are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- **10,082** households
- **3,311** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- **551** grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **2,812** households with at least one person age 65 and over



As a result of participation in Grayson County Extension programs:²

- **225** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **180** children improved their food safety skills by practicing correct handwashing.
- **70** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Grayson County was **\$31,936**.³

The number of children in poverty in Grayson County was **1,871** compared to **1,633** in 2006.³

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Grayson County is **6,219** in 2011.⁴

As a result of participation in Grayson County Extension programs:²

- **45** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **135** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **15** people developed skills to access affordable food.

OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,⁶ between 2005 and 2009 in Grayson County it is estimated that...

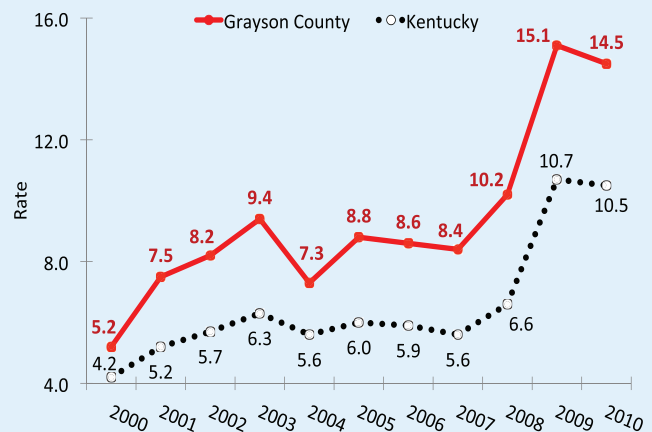
- **45.5%** (+/- **3.8**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **58.4%** (+/- **8.9**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **19.2%** (+/- **4.4**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

As a result of participation in Grayson County Extension programs:²

- **19** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **35** adults and youth improved their ability to make informed and effective decisions.
- **450** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
