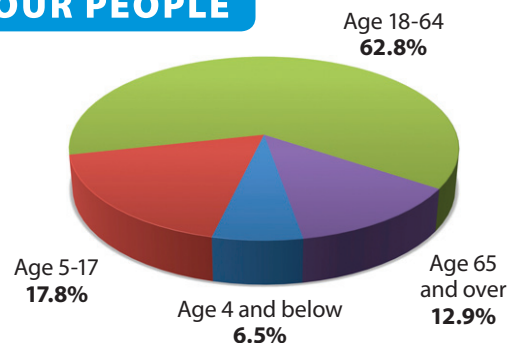
- **Making Healthy Lifestyle Choices** that influence health and well-being

In 2010-2011, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **68,380** contacts with Laurel County individuals and families.<sup>2</sup>

### SPOTLIGHT ON ...

## ACCESSING NUTRITIOUS FOODS

A certified demonstration kitchen was an integral aspect of the Laurel County Cooperative Extension Service facility expansion. With \$90,000 funding from Laurel County Extension District Board, Laurel County Agricultural Development Council, and the Governor's Office of Agricultural Policy, the kitchen promotes local products, provides a place for producers to expand sales by making HB 391 products, and educates the public on food safety and cooking skills. Family and Consumer Sciences staff used the kitchen to offer over 50 different nutrition, food preservation, and food preparation classes. These programs reached 6,428 people and brought over 700 new people to the farmers market. 85% of local producers said kitchen programming had brought new customers to the market.

## OUR FAMILIES

According to the 2010 Census,<sup>1</sup> of families in Laurel County with their own children...

- **68.0%** are husband-wife families
- **32.0%** are single parent families

In addition, there are:

- **23,014** households
- **8,015** households with 1 or more persons under the age of 18
- **1,367** grandchildren under 18 years old who live with a grandparent householder
- **5,615** households with at least one person age 65 and over



### As a result of participation in Laurel County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **3,300** people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.
- **100** people increased knowledge of parenting and personal relationships.
- **380** people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling and food preparation.

## OUR COMMUNITY

In 2009, the most recent data available, the median household income in Laurel County was **\$36,664**.<sup>3</sup>

The number of children in poverty in Laurel County was **4,342** compared to **3,791** in 2006.<sup>3</sup>

The total number of people receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in Laurel County is **15,082** in 2011.<sup>4</sup>

### As a result of participation in Laurel County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **660** people increased leadership knowledge and skills.
- **800** people improved communication skills to address community issues.
- **2,500** people developed skills to access affordable food.

## OUR ECONOMY

According to the 2010 American Community Survey 5-year estimates,<sup>6</sup> between 2005 and 2009 in Laurel County it is estimated that...

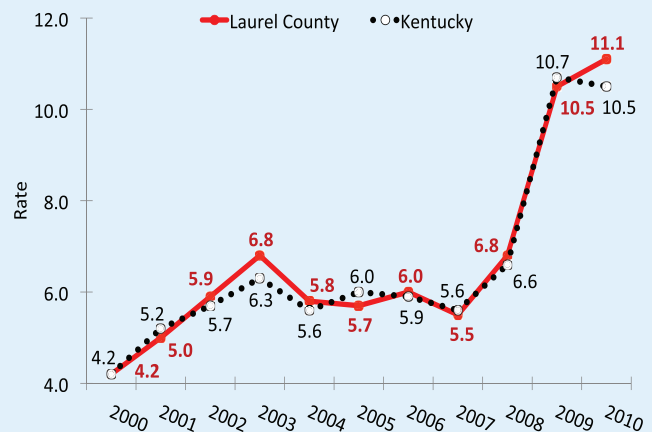
- **50%** (+/- **2.7**) are married-couple families with both husband and wife in the labor force
- **61.6%** (+/- **7.1**) are children under 6 years old with all parents in the labor force
- **17.2%** (+/- **3.8**) are people 65 years and over below poverty level during the past 12 months

### As a result of participation in Laurel County Extension programs:<sup>2</sup>

- **150** people increased knowledge of economic and enterprise development.
- **250** people adopted money management practices to reduce debt and increase savings.
- **3,100** people demonstrated increased practical living skills.
