In 2012-2013, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension made **27,922** contacts with Madison County individuals and families.²




Madison County projected population¹

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

BEEF IT UP COOKING SCHOOL

n response to escalating food prices, food safety concerns, and Kentucky's obesity rate, the Madison County FCS program launched the "Beef It Up Cooking School." The program focused on food safety, healthy preparation methods, presentation ideas, and affordable meals using beef. With the help of a Kentucky Beef Council grant and local volunteers, the event reached maximum capacity with 120 attendees. Evaluations indicated: 75 percent of survey respondents learned ways to save on their food budget; 84 percent learned ways to make cooking at home more convenient, and 78 percent learned at least one new food preparation technique or concept.

FAMILY ACCESS

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,3 in Madison County...

- 19.2% (+/- 3.0) of families with children were below poverty
- 7.6% (+/- 1.7) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 19.7% (+/- 1.3) of households had retirement income
- **3.9%** (+/- 1.1) of households had no vehicle

The USDA Food Environment Atlas⁴ indicates that in 2010. Madison County had 7,958 people, 1,934 children and 811 seniors with low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.*

In addition, **2,987** residents had **both** low income **and** low access to stores.

As a result of participating in Madison County Extension programs:²

- 6,423 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 760 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 500 people in Managing in Tough Times: Moneywi\$e became aware of how to manage current economic events.

COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY

In 2011, Madison County had:

- 13 Grocery stores (any kind)⁵
 - 8 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)⁵
 - 5 Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)⁵
- 44 Gasoline stations with convenience stores⁵

In the county, there were:

- 7 Roadside markets that served the county⁶
- 4 Farmers market locations⁷
- 88 SNAP** authorized stores (food stamps)4
- 14 WIC*** authorized stores4

In 2011, there were \$310,936.11 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Madison County.4

As a result of participating in **Madison County Extension programs:**²

- 2,500 people increased knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 525 people increased knowledge of safe storage, handling, and preparation of food.
- 1,800 people increased knowledge of lifestyle changes to improve personal health.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

In Madison County...

- 4,875 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP** (food stamps) in 2011, up from **4,005** children in 2007 (up 21.7%).9
- **50.0%** of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.9
- There were **7,500** SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$263.79.8


Madison County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.¹⁰

As a result of participating in **Madison County Extension** programs:²

- 480 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 2,350 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
- 2,220 youth reported eating more healthy foods.
