
OUR FOCUS

SPOTLIGHT ON ...

LOSE IT MENIFEE COUNTY

A ccording to Kentucky Health Facts, 27 percent of Menifee County residents report a higher incidence of poor health and diabetes. To address this issue, the Menifee County extension agents, along with community partners Menifee County Wellness Center and St. Claire Medical Clinic, offered "Weight the Reality" series. Participants were challenged to make lifestyle changes related to food choices and preparation, physical activity, and weight management. Postevaluations indicated that participants lost an average of 4.36 pounds over the six-week period. Eighty percent of the participants reported increased motivation and said they continued to lose weight after the series ended. Many reported that they are still keeping a log of exercise and food intake and are using the recipes at home.



FAMILY ACCESS

According to the 2007-2011 American Community Survey,³ in Menifee County...

- 28.3% (+/- 13.7) of families with children were below poverty
- 16.8% (+/- 8.9) of those ages 65 and over were below poverty
- 21.6% (+/- 4.4) of households had retirement income
- 8.0% (+/- 3.5) of households had no vehicle

The Food Environment Atlas indicates that in 2010, Menifee county had 140 households with no vehicle and low access to a supermarket or large grocery store.

As a result of participating in **Menifee County Extension programs:**²

- 300 people demonstrated an increase in practical living skills.
- 1,050 people utilized healthy food delivery systems and access points.
- 20 people were involved in addressing community issues.

COMMUNITY AVAILABILITY

In 2011, Menifee County had:

- 2 Grocery stores (any kind)⁵
 - 2 Grocery/supermarkets (except convenience)⁵
 - O Convenience stores (i.e. food marts no gas)⁵
- 6 Gasoline stations with convenience stores⁵

In the county, there were:

- 2 Roadside markets that served the county⁶
- 1 Farmers market location⁷
- 11 SNAP** authorized stores (food stamps)⁴
- 6 WIC*** authorized stores⁴

In 2011, there were \$120,132.20 in SNAP redemptions/per SNAP authorized store in Menifee County.⁴

As a result of participating in **Menifee County Extension programs:**²

- 2,000 people made lifestyle changes to improve health.
- 2,050 people implemented practices for safe storage, handling, and preparation of food.
- 2,000 families/caregivers reported eating more healthy foods.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

In Menifee County...

- 639 was the average monthly number of children who received SNAP** (food stamps) in 2011, down from 652 children in 2007 (down 2.0%).9
- 76.0% of students attending public schools were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.⁹
- There were 926 SNAP cases and the monthly SNAP benefit level was \$247.42.8


Menifee County is served by God's Pantry Food Bank of the Ky. Assoc. of Food Banks.¹⁰

As a result of participating in **Menifee County Extension** programs:²

- 3,000 people adopted practices to increase food access and affordability.
- 1,000 people supplemented their diets with healthy foods they produced or preserved.
- 1,425 youth increased their knowledge of healthy food consumption.
