PROGRESSIVE AG SAFETY DAY

enifee County 4-H Youth Development and Family and Consumer Sciences agents received the Progressive Agriculture Safety Day grant to promote farm safety awareness. Progressive Agriculture Safety Day attendance included 85 third-graders and more than 50 volunteers from more than 20 community organizations. Topics included safety procedures and awareness for being home alone; fire; medical; sun; food; knives; farm equipment; animals; guns; Internet; social media; germs; weather; and electricity. Evaluations found that 100% of participants learned something new about safety; they committed to stay away from tractors and other power take-offs; to lock doors and windows when home alone; to use the Internet only with parents' permission; and to stay away from guns and knives.


AVAILABILITY

In 2010, in Menifee County, there were...³

- 516 renter households
- 1,924 homeowner households
- 61 vacant housing units for rent
- 79 vacant housing units for sale

According to the Kentucky Department of Education, in 2012-2013. 132 children were homeless or were precariously housed in Menifee County.4

HEALTH AND SAFETY

In Menifee County, it is estimated that in 2008-2012...²

- half of all renter-occupied housing was built before 1987 (+/-7 years)
- half of all owner-occupied housing was built before 1986 (+/-4 years)

According to 2008-2012 American Community Survey² estimates in Menifee County...

- 2.7% (+/- 1.8) of all households had no landline or cell phone
- 55.4% (+/- 7.5) of workers living in Menifee County worked in Kentucky but outside the county and 1.0% (+/-1.0) worked outside the state
- Half of all workers traveled 38.1 (+/- 6.3) or more minutes to work

AFFORDABILITY


According to American Community Survey estimates for Menifee County, in 2008-2012...2

- **72.1%** (+/- 14.6) of renter households paid **35%** or more of their income for rent and utilities
- 28.5% (+/- 9.9) of homeowner households with a mortgage and 13.2% (+/- 6.2) of homeowner households without a mortgage paid 35% or more of their income for housing costs
- 52.4% (+/- 6.5) of homeowner households did not have a mortgage
- 27.3% (+/- 4.8) of all housing units were mobile homes

According to the most recent poverty estimates, in 2012, **33.2%** (+/- 5.2) of residents in the county were living below poverty.5

In 2013, residents needed to earn \$10.87 an hour (or work 1.5 iobs at \$7.25 an hour**) to afford a twobedroom apartment at Fair Market Rent in Menifee County.6
